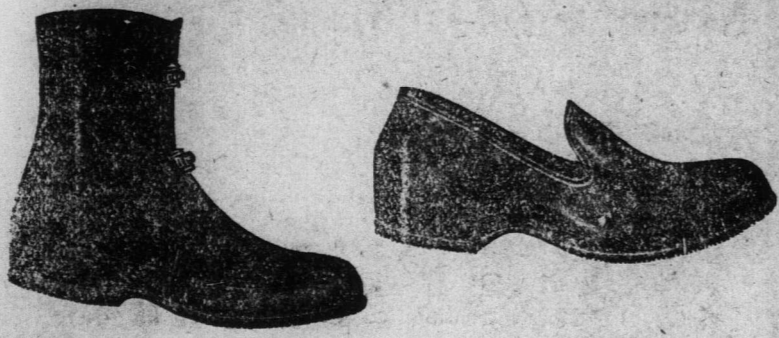

## \$250,000 for Boy Training.

London, Nov. 5.—A scheme of great national importance, the main object of which is to make the British boy a patriot, has been initiated by Sir Robert Lucas-Tooth, a prominent philanthropist.

He has presented to Prince Alexander of Teck \$250,000 with which to found a fund to be called the Lucas-Tooth Boys' Training Fund, to assist and extend the existing organization for the physical and moral training of boys, to inspire them with a spirit of patriotism and loyalty, and to encourage them to fit themselves for the service of their country.

In the main the idea is to imitate as far as possible under the voluntary system in Britain the work of the Australian cadet scheme. The donor has lived this scheme working, for he has seen much of his seventy years of life in Australia, where he went to make a fortune soon after leaving Eton.

## Cable News.

YOKOSUKA, Nov. 20.  
The Japanese cruiser Izumof, sailed for the Pacific Coast of Mexico this morning.

BERLIN, Nov. 20.  
Emperor William caught cold today and is compelled to cancel his engagement to attend the opening convention of the German Shipbuilding Society.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.  
The House of Representatives yesterday presented Miss Jessie Wilson, the White House bride, with a sparkling diamond pendant, resting in a satin-lined jewel box, and accompanied by an appropriate sentiment, inscribed on parchment. The pendant is valued at \$2,000.

LONDON, Nov. 20.  
A surprisingly large amount of business is being offered at Lloyd's in connection with Mexico. Many public buildings and business premises in Mexico City have been insured at 5 1/4 per cent. for six months, against damage through rioters, civil war, or bombardment. Some underwriters are fighting shy of business at this figure. Lloyd's liabilities for losses during the recent storms on the Great Lakes aggregate \$7,500,000.

LONDON, Nov. 20.  
The States' Embassy here, on request of Lord Cowdray, cabled Washington to-day, asking for protection of the imperilled interests of the Pearson concerns in Mexico. Cowdray declares that the presence of U. S. battleships at Tampico had a salutary effect by preventing the destruction of property, and asks for a continuance and extension of such protection. He also asked Ambassador Page to convey to Washington his denial of having extended financial or other assistance to Huerta.

DUBLIN, Nov. 20.

A movement has been started to organize an Irish National Volunteer force to uphold the authority of the Crown and Government in Ireland, on the lines of the Ulster force which Carson is organizing. The leaders are Sir Robert Casement, who investigated the Putnam atrocities, and Captain White, son of the late Field Marshal Sir George White. The captain, who went through the South African War, with distinction, has resigned his commission in the Army, in order to organize this force. He intends to start by recruiting men now on strike here.

## Goes for Valuable Cargo.

The S. S. City of Sydney, which sails to-night, will not go to Montreal this trip. From here she proceeds to Sydney to bunker thence to Charlottetown where she will take a full cargo of produce. Returning she will again call at Sydney and will land a small portion of her freight there.

C.C.C. DANCE.—Over three hundred persons attended the dance held in the British Hall last night, in aid of the C.C.C. Band. The affair was voted to be one of the best successes yet. The music discoursed by the band was exceptionally good. At 2 o'clock this morning the crowd dispersed. The ladies, who promoted the dance, are pleased with the results of their efforts.

## Healthy and Unhealthy Lighting.

Gas, it may be said, vitalizes the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitalize, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:—

Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this, amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson B. Hurry.

He would merely add that the members who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Duffield, before the Society of Medical Officers.

I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days, was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort, sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner, but which with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter been employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Lewes, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—nov8,13
