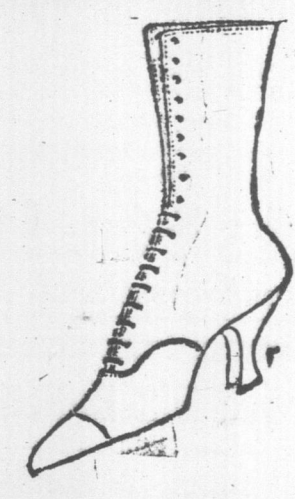

## Zeppelin's Greatest Triumph.

It was on Sunday, August 29, 1909, that Count Zeppelin brought his great aerial voyage from Friedrichshafen to Berlin to a successful conclusion. He appeared before the horizon on the

western outskirts of the capital at half past ten in the morning; and, after performing many complicated evolutions above different parts of the capital, and receiving a delirious welcome from three million people, he landed at a few minutes before two in the northern suburb of Tagel. Enthusiastic "Hoche!" from thousands of German throats greeted Count Zeppelin as he flew over the city at a low altitude, plainly visible to the multitudes, and thousands of toy airships, bearing the inscription "Welcome, Zeppelin!" were released, floating upwards towards the airship. After giving every inhabitant of the metropolis an opportunity of seeing the marvellous capabilities of his invention, the Count steered for his landing-place at Tagel, where the Kaiser and the Imperial Court had proceeded by motor car. As the first anchor of the gigantic airship was thrown out, the Kaiser and his suite moved up to the spot selected for

the landing, while about a hundred men of the Ballooning Corps dashed forward, and clung to the anchors. The airship then descended quite gently without the slightest hitch. Hundreds of the spectators broke through the military guard, and mingled with the Imperial Court as the band started the strains of welcome — "See the conquering hero comes!" When the airship landed,

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the Count sprang from the aluminium deck, and advanced bareheaded, towards the Kaiser. That impulsive monarch, full of generous excitement, ignored all rules of court etiquette, and, running to meet the Count, kissed him on both cheeks. Then he shook his hands vigorously and incessantly for several minutes, while he uttered warm words of congratulation. Count Zeppelin was overcome with emotion. The Kaiser then presented him to the Empress, and, one by one, the great ones of the land, advanced to congratulate the Count. After this, surrounded by a cheering crowd, the Kaiser was escorted by the Count round his airship, and had its mechanism explained to him. The Kaiser and Count Zeppelin, followed by the Imperial Family and State dignitaries, then drove to the Royal Court to lunch. All the way they met with a magnificent reception from multitudes who thronged the streets, waiting to catch

a glimpse of this aerial idol. No one imagined at that time that the airship was the forerunner of a series of baby-killing machines. Such is fate!

## The Last of the Incas.

On August 29, 1533, two hours after sunset, Atahualpa, Inca of Peru, was burned in the square of his own town of Caxamalea by the sentence of a court presided over by Francisco Pizarro, leader of a few hundred Spanish freebooters. His person had been seized by gross treachery, and he had been kept for months imprisoned without cause, as he had paid a ransom of several millions sterling. But the time had come when it seemed expedient to remove him, and so the last native monarch of Peru died the death of a malefactor at the bidding of an alien adventurer. He died with stolidism, and the deed is an indelible stain on all concerned. In fact, as Prescott writes: "The treatment of Atahualpa, from first to last, forms one of the darkest chapters in Spanish Colonial history. The bloodstained annals of the Conquest afford so much example of the cold-hearted and

systematic persecution, not of an enemy, but of one whose deportment had been that of a friend and benefactor. That, indeed, had been his cardinal error, for which not only he but his unhappy people had to pay to the uttermost. Nor can Pizarro, although no doubt his hand was forced to some extent by his cruel and rapacious followers, be acquitted by a large share of responsibility for a policy characterized throughout by barbarity, hypocrisy and fraud. It only adds to the baseness of the business that Atahualpa's funeral obsequies were performed next day with great solemnity; that Pizarro and the principal cavaliers went into mourning for their victim, and that the troops listened with devout attention to the service for the dead, recited by a priest who had been urgent in pressing for the monarch's removal.
