COST NINE MILLION TO REBUILD HUGE SHIP.

NEW YORK, May 12-Fares exceeding \$1,000,000 will be paid by those who sail on the Leviathan on her maiden trip July 4. Several milionaires are bidding for the right to pay the top price \$5000-to occupy the former imperial suite, designed on the old Vaterland for the German Kaiser.

"There will be no steerage," said W. J. Love, vice-president and general manager of the United States Shipping Board. "The Vaterland had three classes and steerage. The rebuilt Leviathan has three classes only-with a minimum fare of \$275."

Passengers and crew will total 4674. The first class cabin will accommodate 976, second class 542, and third class 1880. The crew comprises 1276. The commander will be Captain Herbert Hartley, formerly of the

Vice-President Love amplified for his announcement that rebuilding operations now nearing completion at Newport News, Va., made the Leviathan the largest ship affoat. Her gross tonnage is now 59,956.45, as against 54,282 originally, 3,405 Hore than the Majestic, although she is eight feet shorter and only a fraction of a foot wider.

"It cost \$8,500,000 to rebuild and refit the Leviathan," said Love. "The ship is now worth \$25,000,000. She has been converted from coal to oil

Crosses in Six Days.

"She will sail from New York for Southampton every three weeks, making the trip in six days. Each trip will consume 5,400 tons of fuel oil. If this 1,462,300 gallons were gasoline it would run a flivver around the world 1,000 times, or would drive a car 10,000 miles a year for 263

"The weight of the Leviathan loaded is 71,276 tons. To transport this weight on land would require 2,380

"There are twelve decks, five passenger elevators, and six freight elevators for luggage and provisions. Even the engine room has an el-

"The swimming pool, for firstclass passengers only, is 38 feet long, 20 feet wide, and from 3 1-2 to 6 1-2 feet deep. It carries 30,000 gallons, or 118 tons, of water. There is a gymnasfum 16x40 for the first-class and another 14x27 for the second class. Also two libraries, containing 4180 volumes.

"Safety is assured on the Leviathan, There are 68 life boats and two 31foot motor boats equipped with wireless, the 70 boats having a capacity gyro-compass, similar to those used on battleships; draft gauges so the amount of water the vessel is drawing can be read on the bridge; four microphones for submarine signals; two high-power searchlights: 13 watertight transverse bulkheads: and 18 watertight sliding doors hydraulically operated and controlled from the bridge.

"Fire protection includes a 45-station alarm system, 28 miles of copper tubing in which expansion of air raises an alarm of fire automatically, 11,000 feet of hose, and 10 pumps having a capacity of 1,670 gallons a

Hospital For 34.

"The Leviathan has 15,000 electric lamps, and a generating plant providing enough power to supply an ordinary home for seven years. There is a social hall 53 x 75, with a 21-foot ceiling. On board will be three doctors and three hospital stewards, with an operating room and a hospital accommodating 34 patients, in addition to the crew's hospital accommodating 16.



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
