Diplomats Abroad

MUST PAY HEAVILY TO ENTER TAIN KINGS.

Washington, Aug. 8. (A.P.)—The pomp of European courts has not decreased noticeably since the war, according to reports of American diplomats to the State Department. American Ambassadors are continuing their complaints of inadequate salaries to meet the heavy drain of social entertainment, and are citing post-war troubles of entertaining royalty at functions which equal or surpass the glided affairs of pre-war days in Europe.

For instance, the state dinner given recently by George Harvey, American Ambassador to the Court of St. James, to the British royal family set back the American envoy something over \$8,000—for one dinner and trimmings. In fact, the trimmings constituted a large part of the bill, which contained an item of \$900 for palms and ferns given standing room in the fireplaces of the American embassy for the occasion.

Tradesmen holding the royal favor have to be reckoned with in the entertainment provided by American diplomats. The caterers are virtually chosen for the American entertainer by the lord chamberlain of the royal palace, no unknown or plebian chefs being permitted to cook for or serve the king or queen. Decorators florists and a train of other tradesmen having the royal approval also must be selected by the American host and their work, as well as their bills, go a long way in directing the function.

Entertainment occasionally of the rulers of the nations to which they are accredited is an inescapable duty of American diplomats, who are provided with no entertainment fund to cover the costs of food and service. A few are wealthy enough to bear extraordinary expenditures for social entertainment, but the poorer ones say that the war has not toned down the "class" of the required social duties.

The higher standing abroad of the American dollar is said to help some in bearing the expense, but in many cases local tradesmen add to their bills, in the cases of the "rich American" diplomats, more than sufficient to meet the difference in the rate of exchange.

Peat Fuel Should Receive Attention.

The peat bogs at Alfred, Ont. have up to date cost \$300,000 of public money. It has been demonstrated that peat is a useful fuel, as well as not too great a factor. The engineers directly concerned in these experiments state that they have developed a commercially feasible process of extracting and drying this fuel for use, and the departments of mines in Toronto and Ottawa are said to agree that the undertaking is one that should not be allowed to lapse. The Dominion Government has done its share in placing this undertaking on its feet. It is now up to Ontario's Provincial Government to nurse it along until such time as private enterprise will take hold and make it a commercial success. Ontario's former Conservative Government did its share in the development. The late Drury Government did nothing at all, being too busy making roads and looking after the public's morals to give it any attention. It would now seem a matter of good business on the part of the new Ontario Government to see that the development proceeds to the point where a plentiful supply of this use-

Are Our Forests Worth Saving.

We have 150 million acres of soil in Eastern Canada better adapted to tree crops than to farm crops. And no other forest region in the world is so accessible by water and by rail. This vast area, properly stocked and under intelligent use, could supply the markets of the world. No other forest region contains such a large number of commercial species and so widely adapted to various uses.

With an adequate forestry program we could, in the future, replenish the diminishing supplies of the eastern states with lumber and paper made in Canadian mills by Canadian labor. Why should not this country go into the business of raising forest products to compete in the markets of the world, as well as wheat, beef, butter and cheese for the same purposes?

Our forest lands now yield us products to the value of 500 million dollars annually. This enormous economic advantage cannot exist many years longer unless there is more effective fire protection. In order to get more effective fire protection the public must invest more money in it. The amount spent on licensed lands averages less than a cent an acre a year. When we consider the total forest area of Canada, then we find we are investing less than a fifth of a cent an acre annually to ensure the continuance in the future of the second largest wealth-producing industry in the country. If the people of Canada think it worth while to keep their industries going they must pay more for forest protection than they are paying at present.

Torbay Annual Garden Party.

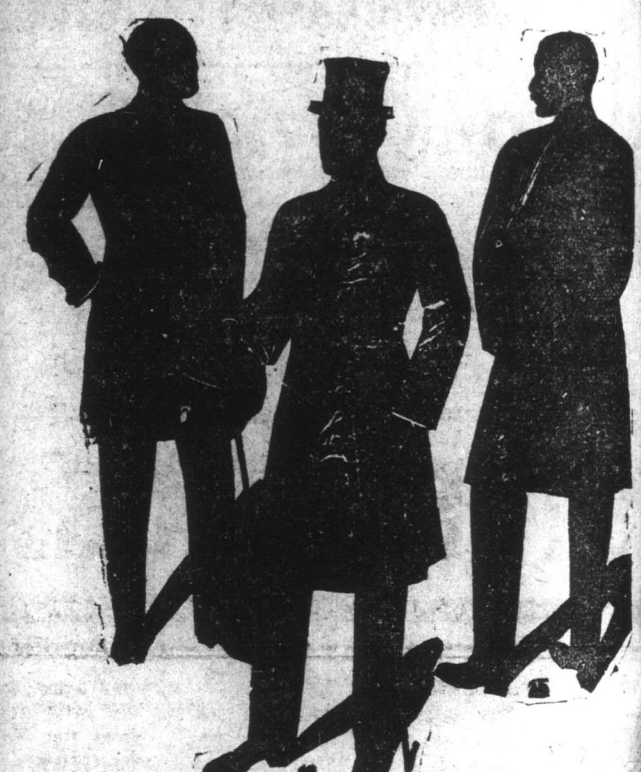
