of Weights and Measures. ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS.

In reply to Mr. Scammell the Minister of Education stated that the increase in the augmentation grant to Teachers was caused by the demands on the grant by Teachers receiving higher grades. The increase in inspection grant is made necessary owing to the Harvey Bequest, which was used for the purpose being no longer available. Increase in grant for special purposes is on account of vote for pensions to Teachers. The teachers employed at the Normal School- together with their salaries, are as follows:-Mr. S. P. Whitewoy, B.S.C., \$3,600.00 per annum: Miss Betty Mc-Grath, B.A., \$1,200.00 per annum; Mr. Hogg, B.Sc., (Science) \$400 per annum; Mr. Hutton, vocal music and elocution, \$5.00 per lesson; Mrs. Fraser, English Literature, \$2.00 per lesson; Captain O'Grady, Physical Culture, \$2.00 per lesson: Mr. Murdoch. drawing, \$2.00 per lesson.


