Town and County News.
STATION BURNED.—We learn by a special telegram that the Grand Trunk Railway station at Shakespear was destroyed by fire yesterday (Sunday).

INTERNATIONAL CURLING MATCH.—An interesting international curling match will be played in New York, commencing on Monday next. Canada will send two rinks, viz., two from Hamilton and two from Toronto.

The annual meeting of the Mount Forest Baptist Chapel will be held in the Baptist Chapel, on Wednesday evening 22nd. The Rev. W. S. Ball, agent of the Society, and others are expected to address the meeting.

George Maguire, of Mount Forest, killed a wildcat within the corporation on Wednesday, which measured two and a half feet from point of nose to tip of tail. His catpish clandestine visits to poultry yards are now at an end, and poultry fanciers breathe more freely.

The annual meeting of the Guelph Branch of the Upper Canada Tract Society will be held in Knox's Church, on Wednesday evening, the 22nd inst., at half past seven. The meeting will be addressed by the Agent, Rev. C. S. Eastman, and some of the ministers of the town.

The cattle fair held in Mount Forest on Wednesday last, was largely attended. Prices were lower than at last fair, but quite a number of sales were effected. Oxen brought from \$80 to \$115 per yoke; steers from \$45 to \$55 per yoke; and cows from \$18 to \$25 each.

FORTUNATE ESCAPE.—Mr. James Algie, of Fergus, in returning from his work one evening last week, found that a freight car was standing on the bridge over the Grand River, between Fergus and Elora, and had only time to signal the night train to prevent what might have resulted in a serious accident.

A COMPANY for the manufacture of carpets has been organized in Elora, with a capital of \$17,000. The greater portion of the stock has been taken up, and operations will commence speedily. A Hamilton wholesale house agrees to take all the carpet manufactured. We have been shown samples of the work, and have no hesitation in pronouncing it equal to the imported article.

A CLOSE SHAVE was experienced here this morning. The operation was not performed by any of the gentlemen of the art, but by one of the gentlemen of the Grand Trunk locomotives, and occurred in this wise. A farmer, in attempting to drive a load of produce to the warehouse, stuck on the west main street crossing, and if his team had not been true to pull he would not have been so successful in getting out of the way of the morning train just in the nick of time. The shave was too close to be comfortable.

NEW CHURCH.—A meeting of the congregation of Knox's church, Mount Forest, was held on Thursday evening when the question of erecting a new church was fully considered. A committee composed of Dr. Yeomans and Mr. Robt. Scott were appointed to secure subscriptions. They commenced their duties in the village on Friday, and met with a most liberal response, having obtained during the day, subscriptions to the amount of over \$5,200. Measures will at once be taken preparatory to the erection during the coming summer of a building which will alike be a credit to the congregation and an ornament to the town. The probable cost of the new church will be \$10,000.

WESLEYAN MISSIONARY SERMONS.—The annual Sermons in behalf of the Wesleyan Missionary Society were preached in the church here yesterday. Rev. Dr. Green occupying the pulpit in the morning, and the Rev. W. W. Ross, of Toronto, in the evening. The attendance at both services was large.
