

The Iruth About the Alberta and Great Waterways Railway

(By W. M. Davidson)

IN THE SESSION OF 1909, just preceding the election, A. C. Rutherford introduced his railway policy. It included the A. & G. W. The Calgary Herald declared it was The Herald's own policy.

THAT PAPER, WITH CONSIDERABLE ENTERPRISE, had blazed the trail and had sent a special commissioner, who traveled, among other places, over the proposed A. & G. W. route and approved of it.
