Board of Health Notice.

New arrangements come into force in regard to cleaning closets on July 1, 1901. Every household must put their closets in condition prior to June 15th, discard all pits, and adopt dry earth system.

All householders will be assessed \$1.50 per year, payable half yearly for scavenger services whether he attends on them or not. Special ratings are made for hotels, factories and schools.

All persons must attend to having their closets pits emptied and filled with clean sand, and parties not complying with the rules before the 15th of June will be prosecuted without further notice.
