showery in the Maritime Provinces. The
wind on the lakes has been light and
variable. Maximum temperatures: Cal-
gary, 48°; Qu'Appelle, 54°; Toronto,
57°; Montreal, 62°; Quebec, 62°; Hal-

by General Middleton.**Efficiency of All Departments—The Com-
mander of Canada's Forces Ex-
presses Satisfaction. Complimentary Supper.**General Sir Frederick Middleton, com-
mander of the forces in Canada, arrived at
noon yesterday from Toronto by the C.P.R.
He was met at the station by Lieutenant-
Colonel Smith and Adjutant Wadmore, of
the London Infantry School, and on his
arrival at the Barracks was given the cus-
tomary general salute, with the band play-
ing. At 2:30 p.m. "D" Company mustered
on the parade ground 100 strong, including
the officers. They were then closely
inspected by the General, while going
through the following movements: Av-
ancing in line and column, forming
column from line, deployments, changes
of front, advance guard, the attack for-
mation, marching past the General in quick
time and physical drill, with and without
arms. The company went through the
different movements exceedingly well, their
appearance, steadiness and equipment being
highly commended by the General. He
also complimented the officers on the high
state of efficiency which the men had
reached. The following were the officers in
charge: Lieut. Col. Smith, D. A. G., Capt.
Young, Lieut. and Capt. Wadmore, Lieut.
and Capt. Cartwright, and Surgeon Hana-
van. The band of "D" Company, under
Major Fisher, furnished the music for the
attack, formation and physical drill and
added materially to the martial bearing
of the men.The barracks were then inspected, the ap-
pearance and condition of which were to
the General's entire satisfaction.The large dining-room of the barracks
presented a brilliant spectacle in the even-
ing at the dinner given to Gen.
Middleton by Lieut. Col. Smith and the
officers of "D" Company. Col.
Dawson, Col. Aylmer, Dean Jones,
Mr. Geo. Harris, Father Tierman, Col.
Tracy, Col. Peters and a large number of
other prominent military men and citizens
sat round the table, which, under the hands
of Sergeant Beaumont, was made to closely
resemble a well-laid flower garden. The
designs wrought being decidedly artistic.General Middleton left for Ottawa this
morning, well pleased with his visit to this
city, and thoroughly satisfied with the
Company, Infantry School corps, is far
above the average.**NOTES.**Sergeant Gregory was the General's
orderly while in the city.Lieut. Denison, being on leave of absence
taking a course of instruction in the
Musketry School at Hythe, was not pre-
sent at the inspection.The grounds around the school are look-
ing very clean and neat, especially the
