## The City's Health

Cases of Contagious Diseases Few and Far Between.

London Is the Healthiest City in America With the Purest of Water Supply.

From the present outlook, 1896 bids fair to be the banner year in the history of the city in the matter of health. Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer, stated today that there had been practically no sickness for the past two years. "This fact may be attributed to our pure water," said the doctor. "The water is under one continual test. I am testing well water every day, and when doing this I put the city water through a similar process, and find that it varies little, if any. There is a total absence of any vegetable or animal matter whatever. We are getting through the hot spell splendidly as far as contagious diseases are concerned. Typhoid fever is generally about at this season, but there is little of it in London. There have only been ten cases this year. At present there are three houses in the city placarded for typhoid fever. At the General Hospital there are ten cases, but five of these come from the country. So far this year there have only been for cases of scarlet fever, which speaks volumes for the city as a healthy place. There have been only two cases of diphtheria reported this year.
