DAIRY NOTES. By J. W. Wheaton, Secretary Western Dairyman's Association.

It is gratifying to know that out of the 23 prizes given at the Western Fair for cheese, six went to makers belonging to the cheese factory syndicate started by the association last spring.

The butter exhibit at the Western Fair this year was a very creditable one. There were over 200 cheeses on exhibition from the various cheese centers of Western Ontario.

The dairy exhibit at the Western Fair this year was in bright, new quarters this year, and was so arranged as to show off to good advantage.

Inspector Millar assisted in conducting a test of dairy cows at the Bramford Fair on Sept. 23, and 24. He also had charge of a similar test at the Ripley Fair on Sept. 29.

Application for milk inspection have been more numerous lately, and several applications are awaiting visits from the inspectors.

May Soon Be Settled. More Hopeful View of the Telegraphers' Strike.

A London Delegation to Interview the General Superintendent.

The strike on the Western Ontario division of the C. P. R. has only reached the second stage, and may possibly go no further.

Several of the conductors and trainmen were seen yesterday after the meeting. It is stated by them that if the company hesitate to settle the matter, they will refuse to accept orders from the operators who have filled their places.

A few of the men yesterday took a hopeful view of the situation, and said they thought the matter would be settled by arbitration when no word had been received yesterday.

The operators west, who are in charge of stations, have refused to relinquish the keys until an audit of their books has been made. They still continue to sell tickets, but will not touch a key.

Reading, Pa., Oct. 6.—A breach of promise suit in which there was written evidence of "100,000 kisses" promised to the fair plaintiff was terminated by a verdict for \$3,000 damages in court here before Judge Endicott and a jury. It was the suit of Miss Emma G. Wamsher against Adam A. Stoudt, asking \$10,000 for blighted affections.

It appeared in evidence that in 1885 Stoudt was a public school teacher in Robeson. He became acquainted with Miss Wamsher, daughter of Robert Wamsher, of Geiger's Mills, and they became engaged to be married. After this Stoudt entered in the regular army, and was stationed in the far west. Many letters passed between them, and the promise of marriage, it is charged, was reiterated.

Among the letters were passages like, "My Dear Emma," and "Yours in true love," Aug. 8, 1891, one came from the Yellowstone National Park, saying: "Do not fail to take all the pleasure you can, as I am taking all my time, as if I could get through my enlistment alive and we get married there is plenty of time to settle down."

In another letter several months later, he says: "Time flies and we will soon be together again. Am thinking of you every day, and I never regret it. 'Dearest Kitty, I hope you are having lots of fun. I see you consent to my plans of the future, and am glad of it.' It ends: "Hoping to hear from you soon, my darling, I am your true lover." On Jan. 20, 1892, he called her "My dear, dark-eyed, pretty Kitty," and threatened to box her ears.

"We will fight sometimes, won't we?" he suggests, playfully. "But then we'll kiss and make up. Your devoted lover." "My own dear, little wife-to-be" is another quotation from a letter, "Good-bye, darling, 100,000 kisses for you, dear, old girl; your true lover, Adam."

On Feb. 12, 1892, he wrote: "You have made me very happy by your answer, and you will never regret it, my little dove. I see you have hurt your finger again, little one. If I had been there I would have kissed it, little one, till it would be well. When I get back we will be married and live in Reading. I guess my little dark-eyed dove."

Several witnesses testified to having heard that the two were engaged to be married, and the jury agreed that they must have been. Indeed, if some of the jurors could have had their way, the verdict would have been for \$10,000 instead of \$3,000.
