TO BE HANGED

Trial of Pearson at Hamilton Lasted Five Hours.

Prisoner in the Witness Box Admitted That He Killed Annie Griffin.

[Special to Advertiser per G. N. W.] Hamilton, Ont., Oct. 17.-The trial of George Arthur Pearson for the murder of his sweetheart, Annie Griffin, on Sunday night, Sept. 23 last, began at the assize court an 1 o'clock today before Judge Rose. The evidence was the same as that given at the inquest and preliminary trial at police court. with the exception of that of Pearson, the prisoner, who went into the box and told his story to the court. Edward Niblett, at whose house

Annie Griffin was employed, gave the girl a good character, as did her father and mother. Pearson, the prisoner, went into the witness box with an air of perfect indifference and a smile on his face. He acknowledged that he shot Miss Griffin twice in the head, but gave no reason for so doing. He said he had no reason, and did the deed on the impulse of the moment, without know-

ing exactly what he was doing and why. Pearson throughout the trial seemed never to recognize the seriousness of his position. Lawyer George Lynch Staunton made an eloquent plea on behalf of the young man, and said there was no doubt in his mind that the act was committed during a period when the prisoner was suffering from mental aberration, and he considered him a fit subject for examination as to his

mental qualities. S. C. Biggs, Q.C., crown prosecutor, was brief in his address to the jury, as was Judge Rose, the trial lasting only five hours.

The jury was out less than an hour and returned with a verdict of guilty. Judge Rose sentenced the prisoner to be hanged on Dec. 7 next To the very last, and even when the sentence was pronounced Pearson's nerve never failed him.
