



THE SYNOD

Amendments to the Constitution -Annual Missionary Meeting.

The Synod of the Diocese of Huron resumed work at 2:30 o'clock yesterday

A message from the Synod of the Diocese of Niagara, conveying fraternal greetings, having been received, a reciprocal message was sent in re-

Rev. Dr. Cody, of Toronto, was admitted to a seat on the floor of the

Rev. W. J. Taylor then presented the report of the committee on temperance. It recommended: (1) That other temperance organizations, with a view to securing legislation in regara (a) to the total abolition of drinking saloons, (b) the amending of the license law so as to make the supplying of drink to a drunken man an indictable offense, (c) the making of habitual drunkenness an offense punishable by law; (2) that the habit of treating, which tends to foster drunkenness, should be discouraged both by precept and example by every mem-ber of the church; (3) that the regulations of the present license law should be sustained by a more efficient discharge of police duties, backed up by public opinion. The report stated that the committee had requested his lordship the bishop to send a message wishing Godspeed to the deliberations of the World's Tempercalled attention to the statement made by Field Marshal Lord Roberts specting our forces in South Africa viz .: "That it is the most temperate army that the nation ever sent forth to maintain her cause." was adopted.

Matters that had been referred to the executive committee were next considered. At the last synod the committee was instructed to consider and report upon the subjects of the special grants to the widows of the old commuted clergy that are made owing to the circumstances of the case. The recommendation that they continue was adopted.

Clause 2 recommended that clause 20 of the constitution be amended to read as follows: "In order to provide sufficient means to carry on the work of the diocese, each parish shall be required to contribute to the funds of the synod a sum amounting in the aggregate to not less than \$1 per annum from every family of the church in such parish (two or more persons of a common household, who depend upon the clergymen for spiritual ministrations, shall constitute a family), and the funds so raised, unless otherwise designated, shall be divided as follows: To the mission fund, four-eighths of the whole; to the general purpose fund, three-eighths of the whole; to the widows' and orphans' fund, one-eighth of the whole. Any unexpended balance of the general purpose fund shall be transfered to mission fund. In order to more fully promote the general work of the synod, annual subscriptions and donations shall be collected from each con gregation in such manner as shall be deemed most effective, and every endeavor made to augment the resources of the synod. An annual missionary meeting shall be held, or sermon preached in each church or other suitable place, and a collection made for the mission fund of the diocese. It shall be at the option of the clergymen to raise the contribution to diocese in the way best suited to the condition of his parish, or in the manner following, namely: That, in addition to the annual parochial collection for the general purposes of the synoi, six collections shall be made annually, the proceeds of two of which shall be devoted to the widows' and orphans' fund, and four to the mission fund."

clause was adopted after two following amendments had been lost: (1) by Judge Ermatinger, that church attendance be necessary to constitute a church family; and (2) by Rev. W. Craig, that the amount to be raised for the purposes of the synod be fixed by the executive committee on the basis of church population, amount of contributions by the parish, and the number of services enjoyed. The next clause recommended the adoption of the following canon on inadequate collections: "Any clergyman in charge of a parish where the collections ordered by the synod have not been made and forwarded to the secretary-treasurer of the syned, or where the collections shall appear to the bishop and executive committee to be inadequate, shall be summoned to appear before them, and give an explanation of such default. any clergyman so summoned refuse to appear and give an explanation, he shall be deemed guilty of contumacy, under canon xxii., 'on the discipline of the clergy' (clause 23, paragraph . 5). The executive committee shall report fully to the synod at its next meeting all cases of default and the explanations offered therefor." The clause was under discussion when the synod adjourned.

service being conducted by the dean, Rev. Canons Richardson and Young. Rev. Professor Cody, M.A., of Toronto, preached the sermon, selecting for his text the words "Why could not we cast him out?" found in Matthew xvii., 9th verse. This question, the outcome of failure, was not meant on the present occasion to suggest that the Church of Christ had failed absolutely in its work. The results had been greater than had been deserved or expected. However, they had fallen short of all the Gospel had meant to effect. Hostile spectators often asked "Why can you not cast out evil spirits from society or from the Christian body itself?" Christ himself would have to answer the question. The fault did not lie with God or his gospel. The perpetual elements of an adequate and unchanging power that we have are: (1) a divine message, adapted to the deepest needs of human souls; (2) a power-giving spirit, who abides with us forever, a source which goes with the church throughout all ages; (3) a Lord who is the same yesterday, tothe synod invite the co-operation of day and forever, a living Christ. The other temperance organizations, with blame of our failure was attached to (1) our little faith, or our feeble realization of the gracious and almighty presence of Christ; (2) lack of prayer, which is the practice of the presence of God, at once the proof and nourisher of faith; (3) little self-discipline or abstinence from everything that impairs our fitness for service. Little prayer, little faith, little self-discipline spelled failure in the spiritual life, but these were not the reasons that are most frequently heard. Blame is cast upon methods of work, forms of presenting truth, ecclesiastical organiza-tion, lack of intellectual culture, too little or too much aesthetics, ignorance of sociology. There is doubtless room for improvement in all these fields, but the ultimate causes are deeper, and are indicated in our Lord's reply: Men are saved and demons exance Congress, assembled in London, pelled, not by the wealth, position or England; and finally the committee dignity of the church, but by the power of Christ working freely through the church, full of faith, fervent in prayer, and disciplined in spirit.
