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### MR. MADILL TAKEN IN

His Case Gave Rise to Warm Discussion.

Rev. J. G. Shearer Speaks on the Matter of Sabbath Desecration-Need of Men for Home Missions.

Ottawa, June 20 .- At the Presbyterian General Assembly yesterday, Rev. Mr. McKay, of Lucknow, rose to a question of privilege. He said: I had a pamphlet prepared and distributed on "The Evils of Ritualism." After distributed them, William Campbell, clerk of the assembly, gave orders for them to be gathered up and destroyed. I wish to know did the clerk of this assembly act within his jurisdiction when he ordered the destruction of those tracts?

The Moderator-No member has any right to distribute documents of any kind whatever within the church without the sanction of the court.

Rev. Mr. McKay-I raise no question as to whether I did right or wrong in distributing the tracts, but I ask did the clerk do right or wrong in order-ing their destruction. There is a phrase, "If thy enemy's ox or ass go astray then surely bring it back to him." (Roars of laughter.) The Moderator-I can assure Mr.

McKay he has no enemy in this court Dr. Sedgewick-Does he apply the term ox or ass to ritualism? (Laugh-

Rev. Dr. Campbell explained that he had ordered the papers to be destroyed because there was no authority given for them to be distributed. He knew nothing about the tracts or who had prepared them.

The matter was dropped.

REV. J. C. MADILL'S CASE. The application of Rev. J. C. Madill for admission as a member of Winnipeg Presbytery was brought up through the reading of the report of the committee on applications, which recommended that the application be not granted, but that the synodical committee of Manitoba and the Northwest be permitted to employ him as an ordained missionary for a period of not exceeding twelve months under one

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#### ONTARIO DOCTORS IN CONVENTION.

Slashing Onslaught Upon Certain Alleged

Medical Fads.

Toronto, June 20 .- The twenty-first annual meeting of the Ontario Medical Association began yesterday in the The plowing of the soil precedes the Normal School. Nearly 100 physicians in attendance. In the morning technical papers were read by Dr. William Oldright, Toronto; Dr. Herbert A. Bruce, Toronto; Dr. Angus McKay, Montreal, and Dr. R. W. Garrett, of Kingston. At the afternoon session, Dr. Angus McKinnon, of Guelph, president of the association, gave his an nual address. After speaking of the advertising methods of patent medicine manufacturers and vendors, and the press, regretting that ligious and secular, opened their columns freely to this class of advertising because it paid well, he said "I have referred to the semi-religious 'pray-for-hire-healers,' known as Christian Scientists, and allied to them are the Dowieites. Thus far the medical profession has treated these people with ridicule, or ignored them entirely If they confined their efforts to the unfortunates who imagine they ailments they have not we could well afford to continue thus to treat them but when we find them impudently undertaking to treat infectious dis-eases, such as diphtheria, scarlet fever and smallpox,, diseases which they ar unable to recognize, we think we have come to a point where toleration and forbearance become criminal. We have a right to insist, in order to protect the people from the spread of these diseases, that no man or woman shall be a specific to treat diseases by any be allowed to treat disease by any means whatever who has not had the training necessary to enable him to know the character of the disease h undertakes to treat. These people deny that disease exists, and of course do

not report to the proper officers any case of infection." He pointed out that they thus acted in variance with health regulations, and helped to spread infections as against the regulations governing medical men who were compelled, under penalty, to report infectious diseases to the proper authorities, in order that spread of disease may be prevented.

The necessity of a medical act for the whole Dominion was also referred to. If the concensus of opinion was that each province surrender the con-trol of medical affairs to a single medical affairs to a single minion, then, he held, such a council must be representative in character, and largely, if not wholly, elected by the medical profession.
