A LOCAL BUDGET.

**QUAINT OATH OF A
BRISTOL BURGESS**

Archaic Spelling and Mode of Expression of Queer Document.

County Constable Fred Templar, of this city, has in his possession a curious document, which is a reminder of the conditions which prevailed for centuries in England, when those who were free of the fraternity of a trade were allowed to exercise it, and the usual, if not the indispensable, mode of acquiring this freedom was through an apprenticeship to a member of this body. The document, which is inscribed on heavy parchment, is the oath of a Burgess, taken by Mr. Templar in 1888, on the expiration of his term of seven years' apprenticeship to his father's trade. By taking it he was admitted as a free man of

the city.

The veterans of '66, '70 and of the South African campaign resolved themselves last night into the London District Veterans' Association, with the following officers: President, Mr. George Taylor; first vice-president, Mr. J. S. Dewar; second vice-president, Mr. R. McBride; secretary, Mr. E. D. Griffith; treasurer, Mr. W. Tackaberry, and an executive committee consisting of three members, Messrs. Dr. Woolverton, Thomas Scott and A. Becher, veterans of '66, '70 and South Africa respectively.

A committee appointed at a previous meeting advised that no action be taken towards securing a land grant until it had received an application from the government and claims were proven. It was the committee's suggestion that the association, composed of the different corps mentioned, be reorganized, and that a fee of \$1 per annum be collected from each member for the purpose of defraying the expenses in connection with the association.

Mr. George Taylor will visit the several townships in which the grants are contained, Algoma, Nipissing, Itanby River and Thunder Bay districts, and report to the association on his return as to the most suitable lands.

Mr. Taylor believes that there was not a claim that would be worth less than \$1,500—a present of \$1,500 to each veteran or his heirs. He suggested that it would be a good plan for the veterans of this district to secure their grants as closely together as possible for many reasons. The reports that came from Temiskaming district, about 30 miles north of Toronto, are excellent, giving it a high position as a first-class agricultural country. There was a large Canadian settlement in the Itanby River district, which had fine timber and good agricultural land along the banks of the river of the same name.

Each grant consists of 160 acres, and any veteran desiring to take up a grant at once may do so by making a deposit of \$5, which will be returned to him as soon as he attains his land scrip.

You shall not colour the goods of any Foreigner or Stranger, or Know any Foreigner or Stranger to buy and sell with another Foreigner within the precincts of this city, but you shall give knowledge thereof unto the Town Clerk of this city, without delay.

You shall not implead or sue any Burgess of this city in any Court out of this City, for any matter whereof you may have sufficient remedy within this City.

You shall not take any apprentice that is bond of blood, and none other unless he be born under the Queen's Obedience, and for no less term than Seven Years, and that he be bound by indentures to be made by the Town Clerk of this City for the time being, or by his clerk, and at the end of his Term, if he have truly served you all his Term you shall, if he require you to it, present him to Master Mayor to be made a Burgess.

You shall not take or wear a Livery or Clothing of any Lord, Gentleman or other person, but only your own, or your Crafts, or of Master Mayor or of the Lord High Steward of this City, or of the Sheriffs of the same, so long as you shall be dwelling within this City.

You shall make no Oath or Promise by way of Confederacy, or contrary to the Queen's Laws.

So help you God by the holy Contents of this Book.

Frederick Templar is admitted unto the Liberties of this City the 31st day of July, 1888.
