Plungers Burned Their Money in Big Rolls at Sheepshead Bay.

The bookmakers made a fortune on Saturday last at Sheepshead. They pocketed thousands of dollars wagered on the favorites, Lady Amelia, Ort Wells, Councilman and Leader, although all of the six winners were well bagged. It was an afternoon of disaster for the Drake-Gates combination, who dropped altogether close to \$75,000. They began by wagering \$15,000 on Lady Amelia at 11 to 20. When their commission had been placed on the Thomas King, they bet \$10,000 on a mild killing planned with John E. Madden's Waterside, and got down a fair-sized wager at 10 to 1. The Drake-Gates combination was the next magnet for the combination's money, and \$20,000 went on the Puget filly at 11 to 20. Ort Wells was the real thing, and was the favorite of the plungers, and they sent their agents into the ring with instructions to bet at the Drake-Gates combination would accept on the King Eric colt. Before the bugle sounded the combination has succeeded in wagering \$40,000, it was said, at odds ranging from 4 to 5 to 1 to 2. With Ort Wells was the next magnet, and \$25,000 was the amount of the wager, the odds dropping from 8 to 5 to 6 to 1. But along came Sidney Pagnett's filly, and the money was burned. It was said that Drake and Gates played the last race, with similar results.

NEW COW-FEED

Gave Them Soft-Boiled Eggs to Make Them Thin.

Mannakating, N. Y., Sept. 14.—Sam Solomon, an east side haberdasher, who came up from New York in the spring and bought Chauncey Winter's farm of 160 acres, has had enough of agricultural or pastoral life, and has advertised his place for sale as a farm. Solomon knew absolutely nothing about farming, but he was so sharp at business that his head was broken down, he resolved, without the slightest hesitancy, to tackle farming. Thus, he said, he would get double the milk, and he would not have to give to only half as often to the dairy. When he found he didn't get any more milk, he was being robbed. JENKINS GETS FOOLISH; WANTS TO FIGHT JEFF

New York, Sept. 16.—Tom Jenkins, the wrestler, issued a challenge to Jim Jeffries for a rough-and-tumble fight. He admits that the champion can dispose of him easily in a fight in which Jeffries of Queensbury rules predominate, but he thinks he is the better man in a scrap. He proposes: "If Jeff will take me on in a rough-and-tumble bout, I will give him \$5,000. I can get backing for \$5,000. Of course, I don't think we could fight in this country. We can hold the bout in Mexico, and I am not afraid of Jeff. I can use my fists a bit and little else. I believe I would win. I am as strong as Jeffries, and with my knowledge of wrestling, I would be a better man in a bout governed by certain rules."

## NEW SEARCH FOR BURIED MILLIONS

Major in the British Army Goes to Seek Treasure in Galapagos Islands.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 12.—A recent dispatch from Valparaiso, attracted the attention of a state department official. It told of the British yacht Cavalier, owned by Major Maude, of the royal army reserve, being headed for Galapagos, and that the treasure was to be made for treasure said to have been placed there by pirates many years ago, and was estimated in value at \$25,000,000 to \$50,000,000. "Still after the Galapagos treasure," he remarked on reading the dispatch. "Well, I hope they find it. They are on a quest that to my mind is the most fascinating in the world.
