DOWNPOUR OF RAIN SPOILED THE HOLIDAY

Londoners Managed to Have a Fairly Good Time Yesterday However.

The Civic Holiday in London was an extremely quiet day. There was no demonstration of any sort, baseball games at Queen's Park and Tecumseh Park, being the only forms of diversion.

Consequently it was a great day for picnics. Several thousand went to Port Stanley, both the Traction Company and the Pere Marquette doing a large business.

Large numbers went to Springbank also. The London Street Railway Company handled a great deal of business, and the day spent at the Park was quite enjoyable.

Many went to the woods about the city. Here family picnic parties enjoyed themselves thoroughly.

The weather early in the day was favorable, but later it became cloudy and threatened rain. As a result, the crowds returned to the city earlier than usual, but not before the downpour occurred.

The Pottersburg picnic was largely attended, quite a number of Londoners taking part in the programme.

Downtown was much like a Sunday. There were few people on the streets, and everything was very quiet and orderly.

The police had practically nothing to do.

EUCARISTIC CONGRESS

Many Great Prelates to Attend the Montreal Gathering.

New York, Aug. 1.—The Roman Catholics of this city are already preparing to send delegations to the Eucharistic Congress, which is to be held at Montreal early in September. Word reached here that the congress will be the largest gathering of Roman Catholics ever on the North American continent. The principal speakers will be Cardinal Gibbons, Mgr. Heylan, Archbishop Bruchesi, of Montreal; Archbishop O'Connell, of Boston; Archbishop Glennon, of St. Louis, and Father Vaughan, of London. One of the most impressive services of the congress will be the midnight mass for men in the Church of Notre Dame. Another impressive service will be an open-air mass at the foot of Mount Royal, Montreal's great park. The cardinal legate, Vincent Vanutelli, will carry the host in procession through four miles of streets.

Protestants as well as Roman Catholics in Montreal will entertain the visiting prelates. Lord Strathcona has placed his town house at the disposal of Archbishop Bruchesi. The cardinal legate will be the guest of Sir Thomas

Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

After the congress Cardinal Vanutelli will visit the Catholic summer school on Lake Champlain, and then go to Washington, where he will be received by President Taft, and will spend some time with Archbishop Glennon, at St. Louis, and Cardinal Gibbons in Baltimore.

EWART'S STRONG CASE

Canadian Counsel Makes Fine Showing at The Hague Tribunal.

London, July 31.—Angus MacMurchy, K. C., of Toronto, has just arrived in London from The Hague where he has spent some time hearing the arguments in the North Atlantic fisheries arbitration. I was anxious to get a Canadian lawyer's impressions of the great legal contest, and I found Mr. MacMurchy very enthusiastic in his praise of the manner in which the Canadian case is being conducted.

"The Canadian case has been ably presented," he said. "Counsel engaged have shown great knowledge of the issues involved."

J. S. Ewart, K. C., Ottawa, made an exceedingly fine argument. His knowledge of historical and constitutional questions is well known, and it was his duty to present this phase of the subject. His speech revealed a wonderful fund of knowledge and his fair to be one of the finest delivered arguments during the proceedings.

"I was much impressed with the personality of the president of the tribunal. Professor Lammasch is one of the most eminent jurists in Europe, and as an expert on civil law and constitutional questions is perhaps unrivalled. His remarks and interrogations to counsel show deep insight and complete knowledge of the diplomatic relations between the United States and Great Britain from the year 1783."

"One of the outstanding features was the opening speech of Sir Robert Finlay, K. C., M. P., formerly attorney-general of England. His speech occupied over one week in delivery. Sir Robert dealt in a masterly manner with all the questions involved. His presentation was a marvel of brevity and completeness; it showed a thorough grasp of the intricacies of the case."
