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SAILED NEW SEAS IN THE FAR SOUTH

Sealing Schooner Returns to Halifax After an Adventurous Voyage.

Halifax, N. S., April 3.—After a voyage lasting eight months, during which 20,000 miles were traversed and places that have not been visited for over eighty years were called at, the sealing schooner Latooka, Captain Ryan, arrived in port yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Since leaving Halifax last July the experiences of the ship and her crew have been many and varied. The Latooka left Halifax on a seal-hunting and exploring expedition to the Antarctic Ocean. On the way to the sealing grounds the little schooner encountered gale after gale, and progress was made. To add to the bad luck her keel sprang, forward of the foremast, and she began to leak badly. The Latooka was put on the slip at Rio de Janeiro, and repairs costing over \$4,000 were completed.

After leaving Rio de Janeiro the Latooka headed south for the sealing grounds. Away to the south where no other sealer has ever been Captain Ryan went, searching for South Sea seals, which are the most valuable of the furry denizens of the deep. He visited islands which have not been visited by white men for 88 years, islands which are uninhabited, rocky and barren, and rise right up out of the water in some cases between three and four thousand feet high. The Latooka made the highest average catch of the Halifax sealing fleet; it will net the owners over twenty thousand dollars. Captain Ryan did not confine his efforts to catching seals, however, having done a great deal of exploring. The Latooka was always within the ice belt, and went as far south as latitude 60. Here Captain Ryan states is the finest whaling grounds to be found in the world. Whales of all sizes were to be seen continually.

The Latooka arrived in Cape Town towards the last of January, and landed her catch, which was reshipped to London, where it was sold. Two days before the Latooka arrived, the schooner Beatrice Corkum sailed from Cape Town for Halifax. The Latooka made the run to Halifax in the record time of fifty-one days. She is owned by A. W. Redden, G. A. Wooten, R. G. Beazley, Capt. Ryan and First Mate Christian.

CONSERVATIVES TALK OF REORGANIZATION

Mr. Hanna May Succeed Mr. Foster Upon Later's Retirement.

Toronto, April 4.—The mooted reorganization of the Conservative party in the Federal House, consequent upon reports of the prospective retirement of Hon. G. E. Foster, has created much interest in local political circles. In event of Mr. Foster's resignation the name of Mr. A. E. Kemp has been suggested as the party candidate for the North Toronto seat. From the comment of some of the local party men, however, it is evident Mr. Kemp would have to fight for the convention.

The report that a federal call would be extended to Hon. W. J. Hanna, the provincial secretary, to join forces with Mr. R. L. Borden in reconstructing the party, has been given considerable credence by the local politicians. They speak of the Provincial Secretary as an astute politician and a successful organizer. Those of the Legislative members who were in town, when interviewed, declined to discuss such a possibility. They had heard of it in an official circle, they declared, nor did they regard it as at all probable that Mr. Hanna would leave the provincial field at the present time.

Mr. John Shaw, M.P.P., is reported to have expressed the view that a convention of Conservative workers should be held with a view to getting the real root of the trouble. He was all news to Mr. W. K. McNaught, M.P.P., who had heard nothing but what had been said in the newspapers. He declined, accordingly, to discuss the situation. Mr. T. R. Whiteside, M.P.P., was equally reticent, but expressed the opinion that the party was not likely to give up his present ministerial position to tackle such a task. Hon. Thos. Crawford, Messrs. G. H. Gooderham, Mr. P. W. D. McPherson, Mr. P. and Hon. Dr. Pyne are out of the city, while Hon. J. J. Foy is confined to his home from illness. Sir James M. Smith is in the city, but when questioned regarding the report.

CHATHAM RESIDENT BADLY INJURED

Mr. James Fox Run Over by Horse and Carriage—Hon. Dr. Pyne on the Mend.

UNPAID EMPLOYEES

Men in Tilbury East Oil Field Filing Claims Over Patriarch Case.

Chatham, April 3.—News of the police raid on the Toronto offices of Patriarch & Co. came like a thunder-clap to the firm's employees in the Tilbury East oil field, where during the past winter drilling operations have been in progress on leases totalling 140 acres on the Sam, Halliday and Henry Cooper farms. A number of employees were in Chatham yesterday instituting legal proceedings to secure their wages by filing claims against the property, already subject to a \$10,000 mortgage to the former owner, N. H. Bowley. An attempt is also being made to garnish funds due for oil shipped to the Imperial Oil Company. Seven wage claims, totalling \$800, while Mockart and Wesner, oil operators, have filed a lien. More claims are expected.

MEN WITH CAPITAL FOR FAR WEST FARMS

Splendid Lot of British Immigrants Brought Out by the C. P. R.

St. John, N. B., April 2.—Two hundred British settlers, carrying in the aggregate, between \$50,000 and \$75,000 in hard cash, arrived on the Empress of Britain, had themselves featured in cinematograph pictures while landing at Sand Point, and left for the west on a special train tonight. Two cinematograph operators, with complete equipment, left on the train with them, and will "metograph" the party at intervals on their journey westward and until they have become settled on C. P. R. ready-made farms east of Calgary. These pictures will be exhibited in England.

The enterprise of bringing the settlers to Canada and locating them was developed by the Canadian Pacific Railway in accordance with Sir Thomas Shaughnessy's idea to plant English settlers on prepared farms in the west, with a view already planned for them. The credit for the pictures of the settlers en route, and thus of presenting an absolutely correct pictorial record of the making of a Canadian farmer from the time he leaves the old land until he is settled in the new, belongs to the London Daily Mail. This newspaper sent out the cinematograph men and equipment, and will display the result of their labors on screens in connection with the bulletins services at their London office.

An interesting feature of this particular party is that not one of them is likely to go "broke." Before they registered in England it was conditional that each should have not less than \$1,000. Many of them have much more than this, and there are probably half a dozen in the number who are taking a comfortable fortune with them to the west. The party is in charge
