THREE MORE VICTIMS OF TRICKY PLANES

British Ex-Army Officer and Two Americans Were Killed.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, Sept. 29.—Lieut. Lewis C. Rockwell, U. S. A., and Sergt. Frank S. Scott, of the signal corps, both attached to the army aviation corps, are dead as a result of an accident to an army aeroplane yesterday. The machine while in the air fell about 50 feet, killing Lieut. Scott almost instantly. Lieut. Rockwell was so badly injured that he died a few hours later at the Walter Reed Hospital.

English Officer Killed. Hempstead, N. Y., Sept. 29.—John L. Longstaff, a former English army officer, was killed this evening while flying in a Farman biplane with his mechanic, Pierre Chavellier. Seventy feet in the air, a wire connecting the control of the biplane became jammed, and the machine instantly overturned, striking the ground with such force that it was buried two feet.

Longstaff fractured his skull and received serious internal injuries from which he died a short time later. Chavellier is seriously but not mortally injured. He will probably lose his left eye.

HELD FOR MURDER

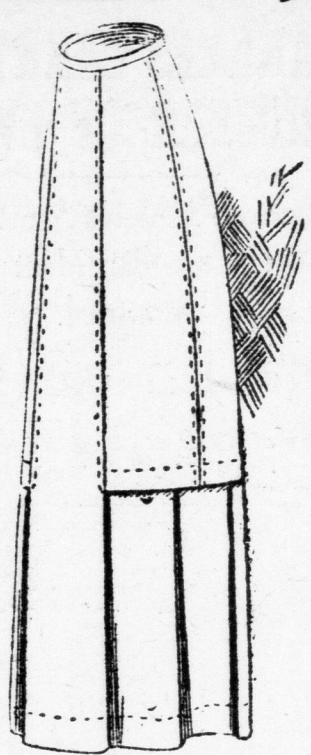
Samuel Dalgorn Alleged to Have Killed Aged Longshoreman.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Windsor, Sept. 29.—The fall assizes opened at Sandwich today before Mr. Justice Britton. The case against Samuel Dalgorn, the colored man charged with the murder of Timothy Mills, an aged longshoreman, in the Michigan Central yards here, is the most important on the criminal list. While the crown has built up what it believes to be a strong chain of evidence against Dalgorn, it is all practically of a circumstantial character, and a verdict of nothing stronger than manslaughter is looked for. There are four other criminal cases of a minor nature to be tried.

Announcement of Big Deal Is Expected in Montreal Shortly.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, Sept. 28.—Has the Canadian Pacific Railway Company secured control of the Allan Line of royal mail steamships? asked the Montreal Star today. This is a question which is now being rather freely discussed by the people interested in shipping in this city.

While the rumor has been current for some time that a deal was in progress whereby the big Canadian transportation company would secure control of the Allan Line it has been consistently denied by officials of both companies. At the present time the negotiations have assumed a definite shape, that it is impossible to keep the matter under cover, and last night at the Mount Royal Club the details of the deal were carefully considered by Sir Thomas Skirrow, the London director of the C. P. R., and Sir Montagu Allan. Both gentlemen were approached by a representative of the Star but declined to affirm or deny the story that there was a deal in progress whereby the C. P. R. would control the Allan Line, but it is likely that the details will be announced in a short time.

DIED SUDDENLY

President of Bank of Liverpool Stricken in Toronto Hotel.

Toronto, Sept. 29.—Mr. Samuel Catlow, vice-president of the Bank of Liverpool, a cotton manufacturer and one of England's leading financial men, was found dead yesterday in his room at the Queen's Hotel. Mr. Catlow's death was due to heart trouble, and was quite unexpected. He expired some time during the night.

FIVE DROWN WHEN GIANI MASKINONGE TIPS CANOE

The McCaffrey Family, of Toronto, Lost Lives Near Omeme—Nothing Known of Tragedy Until Sinking Canoe Was Found—All Bodies Have Been Recovered.

Toronto, Sept. 29.—In the placid waters of Pigeon Creek, which winds its way into Sturgeon Lake, near Peterborough, 70 miles east of Toronto, five people lost their lives yesterday afternoon, when a 16-foot canoe capsized. An entire family was wiped out: William J. McCaffrey, his wife, son and daughter, of 16 South Drive, Rosedale, Toronto, and his mother, Mrs. Charles McCaffrey, of Omeme, a village near which the tragedy occurred. No one witnessed what must have been a terrible struggle for life. An overturned canoe, gradually sinking, found in the middle of the creek, where the water was about 10 feet deep, revealed the almost unbelievable truth. A few hours later the body of William McCaffrey was located and a fishing line, which was wound about his wrist, was being jerked by a 14-pound lure, showing that the direct cause of the fatality was the "strike" of the fish on the bait, which evidently excited the party of canoeists. All the bodies were recovered Sunday after they had been grappled for many hours by a number of villagers. The bodies of Mrs. McCaffrey and her daughter were tangled in the line.

The following is the death toll: William J. McCaffrey, aged 39 years, assistant manager of the supply department of the Canadian General Electric Company, whose home is 16 South Drive, Rosedale.

Mrs. Charles McCaffrey, his mother, aged 65 years, of Omeme, near Peterborough, Ont.

Mrs. William McCaffrey, his wife, aged 38 years.

Maxine McCaffrey, his daughter, aged 13 years.

Howard McCaffrey, his son, aged 8 years.

A Holiday Outing. Mr. McCaffrey, who was a son of Charles McCaffrey of Omeme, went with his family to that village on Friday, intending to spend a short holiday at his old home. With his mother and two children, he started down the Pigeon River on Saturday morning on a fishing expedition. The weather was fine, and though it came on to rain in the evening, there was nothing in the nature of a squall on the water during the day.

It appears that no member of the party was ever seen alive after the canoe had passed from sight down the river, and it is believed that no person actually witnessed the accident.

When the party did not return to Omeme towards evening, according to his expectation, Charles McCaffrey, father of the drowned man, became alarmed, and organized a search party.

Found the Cause. Seven miles down the river the canoe was discovered, floating bottom upward. Drugging operations were commenced immediately. The search continued until 3 o'clock on Sunday morning, by which time four bodies—those of McCaffrey, his wife, mother and son—had been recovered. The clue to the position of the bodies was afforded by the splashing of a large fish. The body of the little girl was not recovered until late in the morning, when a second search party recovered it.

Clutched in the hand of William McCaffrey, when his body was taken from the river was the end of a trolling line. At the other end was a muskallonge weighing fourteen pounds, and vigorously waving the bodies of his victims in the morning when a second search party recovered it.

The watch of the drowned man had stopped at 25 minutes to 3 o'clock. These two facts, taken together, and the manner of the tragedy known to the survivors.

William McCaffrey was an expert canoeist and an expert swimmer. Maxine, the little girl, had taken lessons in swimming. It is not known whether the other members of the party could swim or not.

No Inquest Held. An investigation of the circumstances was made by the local coroner at Omeme on Sunday morning, who came to the conclusion that the facts were so manifest as to render an inquest unnecessary. A multiple funeral will be held on Tuesday, to the cemetery at Omeme.

The late William McCaffrey had been in the employ of the Canadian General Electric Company for about 22 years. He was an Orangeman and an Oddfellow. He was actively associated with many branches of sport, and in particular with the champion team of the Toronto Cricket Club.

The surviving members of the family are the father, Charles McCaffrey, and his wife, Mrs. Charles McCaffrey, of Omeme, and seven sisters—Mrs. Fatt, Mrs. Burnside, the Misses Ada, May and Maggie McCaffrey, all of Toronto, and Mrs. Thompson, of Havelock, and Miss Ethel McCaffrey, of Williamsburg.

PUBLIC DID NOT WANT CHINESE LOAN ISSUE

English Investors Only Took About Forty Per Cent. of \$25,000,000.

[Canadian Press.] London, Sept. 29.—The issue of the "United Voice of Ulster" last week was a failure as far as the public was concerned. Only about 40 per cent of the \$25,000,000 offered was subscribed by the public, and the underwriters had to take up about 60 per cent.

This apparent non-success of the public issue of the loan, however, is due to the fact that the head of the syndicate, to the fact that many of the underwriters are actually large investors to whom the issue of a big loan generally looks for large subscriptions.

In a statement on the subject, Mr. Crisp added a number of applications, including those of the amount asked for in these was \$24,535,000.

The loan is quoted today at 3/4 discount.

Crisp's associates say that the additional Chinese loan of \$10,000,000 being issued in Hamburg has no connection with the Crisp loan.

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The German Government is inclined to disapprove strongly of the \$10,000,000 loan being issued in Hamburg, of which the authorities first learned from the newspapers.

The ministry of finance, which is investigating the matter, is doubtful if it is admitted that government control is perhaps less effective in Hamburg than in other places.

RALLY DAY PROVED A BIG SUCCESS

Event Was Observed in the Churches of London on Sunday Afternoon.

A SPECIAL SERVICE DAY

Every Edifice Filled With Congregations of the Future Hope of Church and Nation.

Parents and children of the Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist Churches, where rally day was observed yesterday, combined in their efforts to make it a success and succeeded beyond their most sanguine hopes. Favorable weather, coupled with bright services, brought out hosts of the little folks, while a large crowd of parents are attracted to the service in the churches.

In the First Methodist Church moving pictures occupied the greater part of the service in the afternoon, and this feature in itself was a magnet to a great many children. The pictures depicted the life of the Chinese, and the work of the missionary among the heathen in that far-away land, and were explained by Dr. Wallace Crawford, a missionary, who has recently returned from the field. In the evening a song service by a very large choir attracted many hundreds of churchgoers.

Dundas Centre was filled with hundreds of the little folks for the Sunday school services. The attendance at this service was the largest for some years past. Messrs. F. W. C. McCutcheon, Mr. Frank Curran, Rev. Dr. Manning gave brief and entertaining addresses to the children and some fine sacred music was contributed by the Sunday School Orchestra.

Three splendid services were held in King Street Presbyterian Church on Sunday. In the morning, the pastor, Rev. W. R. McIntosh, preached a sermon on "Important Points in the Religious Education of the Young." He drew the attention of parents to the fact that the greatest responsibility in educating their children morally was often-times slighted. In the afternoon there was a Sunday school rally, which was featured by an address by Rev. A. Graham, entitled, "Raising and Saving." A unique feature of the service, a flower procession, in which all the children, carrying flowers, took part. The evening service was in honor of the younger element of the congregation, when the pastor based his address on "Efficiency," telling them that in this competitive age the slighest methods practiced by many would not do, and urged them to greater efficiency in all things. The rally services are to be continued throughout the week. Tonight an "At Home" tea is being given by the young people. On Wednesday the prayer meeting will be held, and on Friday the adolescent boys will make social arrangements for the coming winter.

At Knox Church a harvest home service was combined with rally day. The evening service was addressed by Mr. H. Campbell, of Saskatchewan, who spoke on the needs of the western provinces in regard to ministers of the gospel, stating that there was room for fifty ministers at the present time in his province alone.

Many parents as well as children attended the special services in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. The rally efforts will continue the rest of the week. Mr. W. H. Leducott gave a most interesting address to the children of the congregation in the morning. The pastor, Dr. Ross, spoke to the adults of the congregation, and to the children in the evening.

A special program was given by the school orchestra, in addition to bright addresses at the rally in Hyatt Avenue Methodist. The addresses were by Rev. A. V. Walden and Mr. F. Maine.

A successful Sunday school rally was held at Memorial Methodist Church on Sunday. The attendance figure amounted to 178, while the collection in behalf of mission work totalled \$27. An excellent program had been prepared by the executive, introducing several new dramas, all being well rendered. Those taking a leading part were Mrs. Thos. Cottrill and Mr. Frank Whiteball. Mr. John Petherborough, superintendent, presided.

Over 400 were in attendance at the Talbot Street Baptist rally, and all present voted the services to be highly successful. A 100 cent rally contest was held, when three classes succeeded in having their members out in full strength. Addresses to various classes were given by Mrs. (Rev.) Steven and Mrs. Westley (missionaries), Rev. H. H. Bingham, Messrs. Harry Peel and E. R. Wilson.

Blue Book Figures Make Effective Argument for Home Rule Champion.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Sept. 30.—A cable to the Tribune from London says: An effective counter-blast to the talk of the "United Voice of Ulster" in opposition to home rule has been made publication in blue-book form of the latest Ulster population statistics. This document recalls the awkward fact that in a population of 1,581,696 Ulster counts 690,816 declared Catholics, being 43.7 per cent of the whole.

Ulster covers 26.3 per cent of the total area of Ireland, and has a population of 1,581,696 (770,862 males and 810,834 females), or .07 per cent less than it had at the last census in 1901. Of the total, 386,947 are in Belfast county borough, being an increase of 37,767 over the number in 1901.

The following statement shows, according to religious professions, the inhabitants of Ulster in 1911.

Roman Catholics, 690,816 persons, 43.7 per cent of the total population.

Protestant Episcopalians, 366,773, 23.2 per cent.

Presbyterians, 421,410, 26.6 per cent.

Methodists, 48,816, 3.1 per cent.

All other denominations, 52,343 persons, 3.3 per cent of the total population.

Information received, 1,528, 0.1 per cent.

Total, 1,581,696 persons, 100 per cent.
