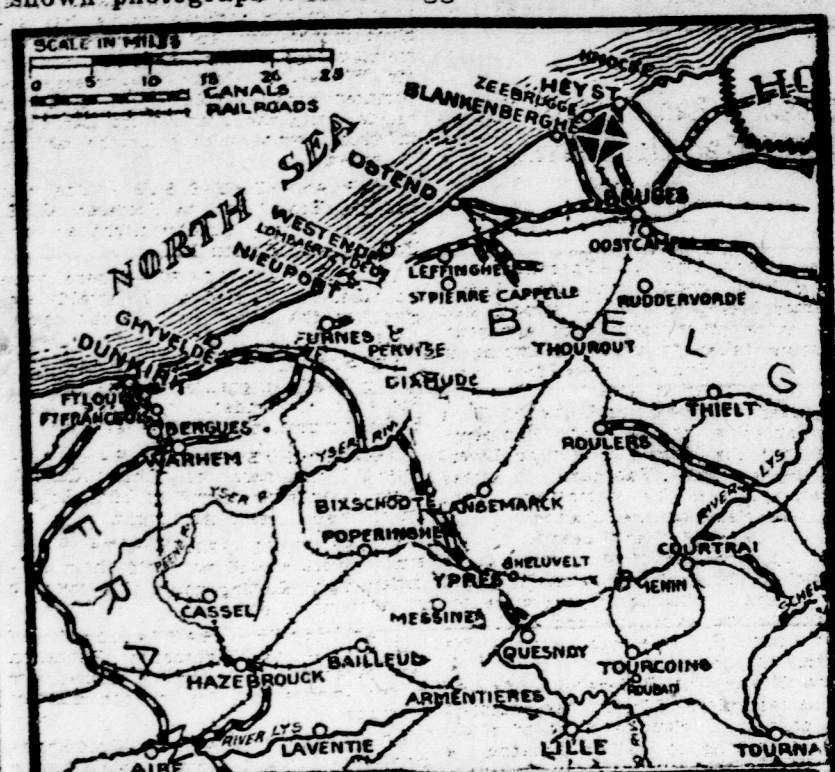

HUGE BRITISH AIR FLEET
ATTACKS GERMAN POSITIONS

Thirty-four Aeroplanes and Seaplanes Defy Storm and Drop
Bombs on Submarine Bases of Enemy—Greatest
Air Movement in History.

(Canadian Press.)
London, Feb. 12.—Aerial warfare was waged today on the largest scale in its history, and under adverse circumstances from the standpoint of the weather. British airmen, buffeting banks of snow in the air, swept over cities of Northern Belgium, held by the Germans, and dropped bombs on Ostend, Bruges and other places.

Thirty-four aeroplanes and seaplanes of the British navy took part in the operations, and all of them later returned safely to their base without casualties to their drivers, although two of the machines were damaged. The raid was made in order to prevent the development of submarine bases and establishments, which might further endanger British warships and merchantmen.

BERLIN REJOICES
AT VICTORY STORY

Report of Russian Loss in
East Prussia Cause of
Holiday.

(Canadian Press.)
Berlin, via London, Feb. 12.—At 11 a.m. the morning papers hail the victory in East Prussia particularly as removing further danger of an invasion of that province. They point to the Russian report of the battle as an indication of the completeness of the defeat, as it admits that the Russians are falling back to the protection of their chain of fortresses.

The victory is especially prized because of the frustration of plans for a strong offensive, which the Russians are believed to have been preparing in this region.

Few Cannon Taken.
The capture of 25,000 prisoners, reported in the German official report, indicates that practically an entire army corps has been put out of the fighting. The fact that the number of guns captured is comparatively small is considered upon in some quarters as indicating that the Russians, who are said to have already lost a third of their artillery through capture, are now insufficiently equipped in this arm of the service.

The Lokai Anzeiger's military correspondent says in commenting on the results in East Prussia:

"We believe that the Russian general staff is not far astray when it assumes that our troops in East Prussia have been reinforced."

The press expresses hopes for further good news from the battles still proceeding in some parts of the eastern line.

Graham-White
One of the Best
Known Aviators

Claude Graham-White, flight commander in the great British raid, is one of the best known of aviators, on account of his daring exploits, and his success as a racer.

He has made several trips to the United States, on one of which in the fall of 1910, he won \$75,000 in prizes. He has been in several accidents, but never injured seriously. Last September he was appointed temporary flight commander in the British navy. His wife was Miss Dorothy Taylor, of New York.

AUSTRIA CONFISCATES
TWO ITALIAN VESSELS

ANCONA, Italy, Via Rome, Feb. 12.—10:40 p.m.—Considerable excitement has been caused here by the report that Austria has confiscated two Italian steamships loaded with wheat for Ancona and Venice, taking them to Trieste, Austria.

SPAIN IS ANGRY

Carranza's Expulsion of Minister Causes
Meeting of Cabinet.
Madrid, Feb. 12.—The expulsion from Mexico by Carranza of Jose Caro, the Spanish minister, has created a profound impression upon public opinion here. All the newspapers discuss the incident at length and comment forcibly on Carranza's action. Meetings of the cabinet and council have been called for today to consider what steps shall be taken.

SEVERE ATTACK ON PENITENTIARY
FROM CONSERVATIVE
MEMBER.

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A bill by Mr. Bickerdike to abolish capital punishment gave the Frontenac member his opportunity.

"I am not prepared to vote for the bill to abolish capital punishment because I believe that to hang a man for an offence is to do him a kindness, if the alternative is to send him to Kingston penitentiary," said Dr. Edwards. He declared that living in Kingston, he knew how the penitentiary there was conducted and stated that "the apathy of the present Minister of Justice was in no wise to his credit."

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But even when our line was broken," he continued, "portions of it continued to resist and our infantry holding them, when assailed from the rear, remained steady, faced about and met the enemy with rifle and bayonet."

"Some of those in the village, who had been engaged in clearing the enemy out of the houses, had got somewhat scattered until one party, only fifteen remained together, when they saw that some of the enemy were established in one of our fire trenches just outside. They at once charged down the communication trench, led by their officer, and killed or captured all the Germans. Forty of our troops were rescued by a French vessel, although exposed to a heavy gunfire from rifles, anti-aircraft guns, machine guns, etc. All of the pilots are safe. Two machines were damaged.

"The seaplanes and aeroplanes were under the command of Wing Commander Longmore and Squadron Commander Portie, Courtney and Rathorne."

BRITISH HOWITZERS
AUDIBLE 20 MILES

Effect of Lyddite Shells is
Terrific, Blowing Houses
Into Air.

ARE IN USE AT LA BASSEE

Official "Eyewitness" Tells of
Accuracy of Artillery
Fire.

(Canadian Press.)
LONDON, Feb. 12.—7:35 p.m.—The British army in France is now using heavy howitzers which, according to a report from the official "eyewitness" with the expeditionary forces, have gained ascendancy over the heavy German guns. These howitzers, he states, were used in successful attacks on the German positions in the brick fields south of La Bassee Canal a week ago tonight.

"Our heavy howitzers took part in this bombardment, their fire being directed on the railway at Feuchtwangen," the "eyewitness" says.

"The boom of these pieces and the detonations of their shells were audible twenty miles away. The explosion of the other artillery, while those close at hand the shrieking of the great projectiles through the air was most impressive, as were the volumes of smoke and debris thrown up. The effect of the lyddite shells was truly terrific, one house being blown bodily into the air, and as they burst among the brick stacks they created great havoc among the enemy."

Position Taken Easily.
"The assault was launched against a strong position on the brick stacks held by the Germans. Our troops rushed the works from three sides at once and captured it with little loss, for, as prisoners afterward stated, the noise of the bursting shells was so great and the clouds of dust with which the defenders were surrounded were so thick that they did not observe our men advancing until too late. At the same time trenches to the north of this point, between it and the canal, were stormed by another party. By seizing these points we were enabled to occupy a continuous line southward from our forward posts on the canal which formed an advantageous position in front of the brick fields."

"We captured fifteen unwounded prisoners in addition to many wounded, a trench mortar and machine guns. The Germans left seventy dead on the ground while our casualties were insignificant."

Strategy Fails.
"The Germans, however, showed no inclination to accept this reverse, for in the early hours of February 7 a body of them advanced along the canal bank, shouting out: 'Don't shoot! We are engineers.' This form of stratagem, unfortunately for the enemy, has now lost its novelty. Our men held their fire until the supposed sappers were only a few yards away and then opened with a machine gun and one of the 'engineers' fell back, leaving thirty dead bodies in front of our line. In the afternoon another attack was attempted but it was repulsed and our artillery fire did not arrive at close quarters."

"A great feature of the recent fighting has been the accuracy of our artillery fire. On one occasion our guns accomplished the feat of blowing the Germans out of their trenches they were occupying on an embankment, although it was only forty yards from that which we were holding. On the 5th the Germans lost most of the enemy's casualties were due to our shell fire. The whole of the area both behind and immediately in front of the trenches we now hold was found to be littered with the bodies of hundreds of Germans killed in the various fights since the 25th of January."

Prisoners Despondent.
"Our artillery fire here has obtained such ascendancy that after the capture of this day our troops actually were able to put up barbed wire entanglements in front of their trenches in broad daylight without being fired at by the enemy's infantry. Prisoners captured here were despondent and much shaken."

"The Germans rely very much on the use of gas, phosphorus and wax, which material is so inflammable that it will ignite if placed in the sun."

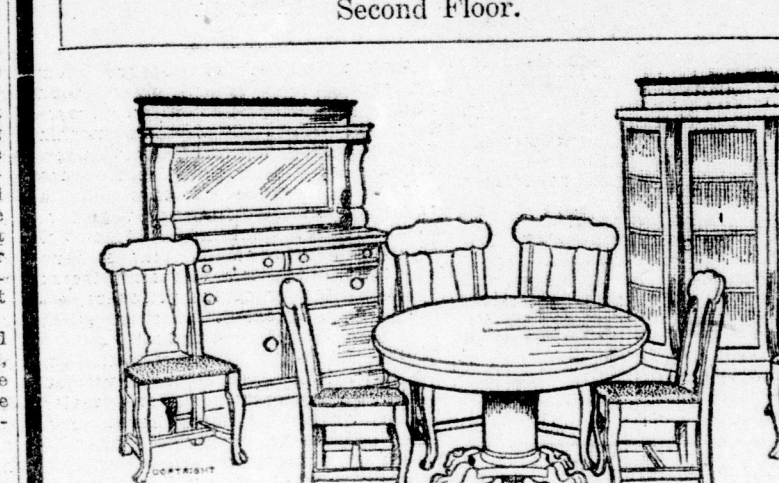
