

[Canadian Press.] LONDON, Feb. 12 .- 7:35 p.m .-The British army in France is now using heavy howitzers which, according to a report from the of-ficial "eye-witness" with the expeditionary forces, have gained ascendancy over the heavy German These howitzers, he states, were used in successful attacks on the German positions in the brick fields south of La Bassee Canal a week ago tonight.

"Our heavy howitzers took part in this bombardment, their fire being directed on the railway triangle," the 'eye-witness' says.
"The boom of these pieces and the detonations of their shells were audible twenty mlles away above the roar of the other artillery, while to those close at hand the shricking of the great projectiles through the air was most impressive, as were the volumes of smoke and debris thrown up. The effect of the lyddite shells was truly terrific, one house being blown bodily into the air, and as they burst among the brick stacks they created great


