Rotterdam Vessel Sights

NEW YORK, May 14.—Bringing tales

of German submarines, icebergs and ro-

mance, the Noordam, of the Holland-

America line, arrived here from Rotter-

dam yesterday, with twenty passengers

in the first cabin, ninety-nine in the

second and ninety-four in the steerage.

Passengers declared the English

Channel is filled with wire net traps

for submarines, with a passage between

which all vessels must pass. The

Channel is effectively closed to sub-

marines, and each day sees new guards

put into effect.

It was not until a few hours before

the vessel reached her pier that the

passengers learned of the tragedy of

the Lusitania, and then the war argu-

ments, which had nearly resulted in

several physical contests on the way

home, suddenly ceased, as the pro-Ger-

man sympathizers went to their cabi-

na. The Noordam thus threaded some

tragedy of the sea on Sunday, May 2,

the day after she cleared from Rotter-

dam. While picking her way through

the English Channel in a fog, after

having sighted three mines, the wireless

operator picked up a staccato series of

"S. O. S." calls, and the captain or-

dered the vessel to turn on her course

San Sylvestre. In the clash the win-

KING GIVES AUDIENCES.
