ST. CLAIR TUNNEL FLOODED; NO TRAIN CAN GET THROUGH

Rain Storm Leaves Four Feet of Water All Over.

[Special to The Advertiser.] SARNIA, July 20 .- With four feet of water standing along its whole length, the St. Clair G. T. R. tunnel between this city and Port Huron is blocked, and no train has been able to get through since 5 o'clock this afternoon. At midnight trains No. 33 and 83 were held here, while eastbound trains are being sent by way of Windsor.

The terrific rainfall, almost a cloudburst, of this afternoon, caused the trouble. At each end of the tunnel there is a cut about a mile long by 800 feet in width. formed huge gutters down which the water raced into the tunnel. 
