ST. CLAIR TUNNEL FLOODED; NO TRAIN CAN GET THROUGH

Rain Storm Leaves Four Feet of Water All Over.

SARNIA, July 20.—With four feet of water standing along its whole length, the St. Clair G. T. R. tunnel between this city and Port Huron is blocked, and no train has been able to get through since 5 o'clock this afternoon. At midnight trains No. 33 and 83 were held here, while eastbound trains are being sent by way of Windsor.

The terrific rainfall, almost a cloudburst, of this afternoon, caused the trouble. At each end of the tunnel there is a cut about a mile long by 800 feet in width. These formed huge gutters down which the water raced into the tunnel. The big electric pumps could not begin to deal with the flood, and it will be the early hours of the morning before the water is removed.

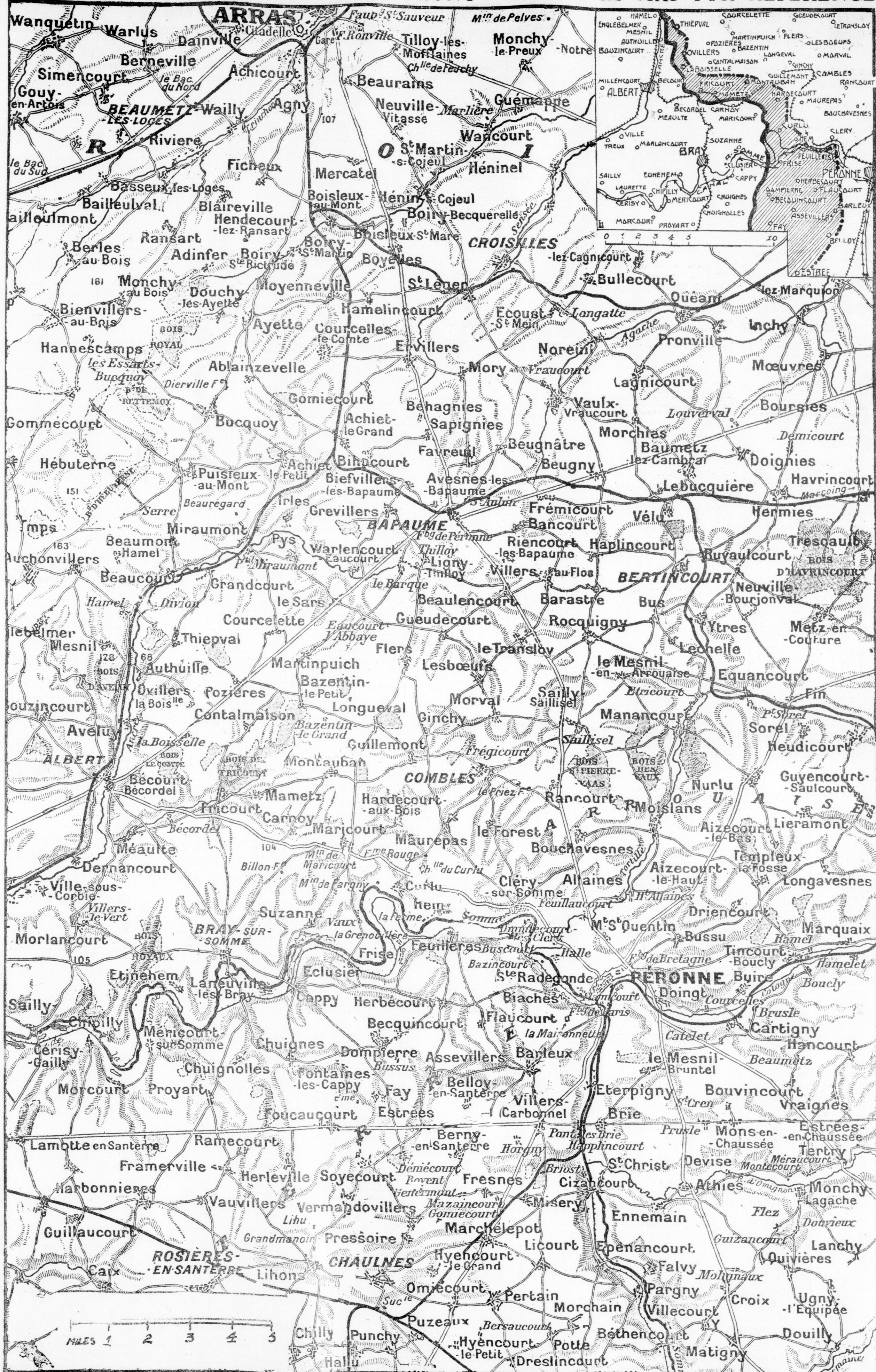
DEFENDS GOVERNMENT'S ATTITUDE TOWARD NICKEL

HAMILTON, July 20.—That the British and Canadian Governments have been in close touch with one another on the nickel question was the statement of Hon. Arthur Meighen, solicitor-general for Canada, at a banquet tendered the Life Underwriters of Canada tonight.

During his speech he read the following cablegram from the secretary for the colonies in the imperial cabinet: "His Majesty's Government are fully aware of the arrangements made for assuring the destiny of the nickel refined from Canadian ore in the United States, and are satisfied with the precautions that have been taken to prevent such nickel from getting to the enemy."

Mr. Meighen also dwelt upon the attitude of the Canadian Government towards the question, and defended Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues. He affirmed that had the export of ore been tampered with international complications with the United States would have resulted, and many Canadians would have been thrown out of employment.
