


PLAN FOR THE NEW HYDRO SHOP

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

TEN-CENT JUMP IN WHEAT FEATURE OF LOCAL MARKET

Both Old and New Grain Affected—Potatoes Creeping Still Higher.

The price of both old and new wheat jumped 10c on the local market this morning. New wheat, which was \$1.70 a bushel and old wheat at \$1.60 a bushel. Old wheat is being offered, and buyers are very scarce.

Potatoes are higher and now sell for \$2.25 to \$2.40 a bushel, and thus to \$1.60 a bushel. New cabbages are selling for 60c to \$1.50 a dozen, and dry onions for \$2 to \$2.25 a bushel.

Apples are steady at 80c to \$1.25 a bushel. Crabsapples bring \$1 a bushel, and pears sell for \$1.25 a bushel. Citrus are offered at 10c to 20c each.

Hay was scarce this morning. The price rose to \$14.50 a ton once more. The lowest price was \$12 a ton. Straw was steady at \$9 to \$12 a ton.

Dairy prices are steady. Creamery butter sells for 44c to 46c a pound, and butter in crocks brings 40c a pound. Eggs are firm at 43c to 44c a dozen. The poultry supply is still good with the prices unchanged. Chickens retail for 30c to \$1.40 a pair, and ducks for 75c to \$1 each. Turkeys bring 25c to 30c a pound.

Live hogs are selling at \$10.15 a cwt., with prospects of lower prices. Fat swine are selling for \$7.60 a cwt., and small pigs for \$4 to \$5 a pair.

There are no other butchers' meats. Hides are unchanged in price.

GRAIN.

Winnipeg, Nov. 9.—November wheat touched \$2 today for the first time since the 1st of October. It was up with an advance of 4 1/2c and May was 5c dearer. Oats were steady with a gain of 2 1/2c in December, and 2c in May. Barley gained 2c. Flax closed at a rise of 4 1/2c to \$1.40 a bushel.

Two dollar fall became a reality when a local firm bought from a brokerage firm 5,000 bushels of November wheat at that price. From the time the wheat looked strong, chiefly on reports of big export business during the week. There was a sharp rise in the price of the wheat and it brought a rush of sales. The buying was of an excellent character throughout the day, and speculative interest still believe in higher prices.

The cash market was completely demoralized by the future prices. Some of the lower grades showed enormous losses in the spread. No. 1 northern sold at 15c over November during the day, but when the market rallied, it touched wheat was hard either to buy or to sell. Oats were in good demand. Barley was strong with flax fair.

Chicago, Nov. 10.—After a wavering start the wheat market today made a decided upward jump. Unexpected lower quotations from Liverpool, with reports of scattered shippers in Argentina, gave a temporary advantage to the bears, but on the decline a number of big houses had to be sold, and the market was capped by further reduction in estimates of the Argentine exportable surplus.

The opening here, which ranged from 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c, was followed by a steady decline. December and May at \$1.32 1/2c and \$1.34 1/2c, respectively, were followed by a moderate general decline. The market rose all around to well above yesterday's level.
