Pattern 3625 is here shown. It is cut in seven sizes, 34, 36, 38, 40, 42, 44 and 46 inches bust measure. A 38-inch size will require 6½ yards of 36-inch material.
Percale, gingham, chambray, repp and poplin are suitable for this style. The sleeve has a short outer seam, that may be left open and the edges of it finished with buttons and buttonholes for a closing; thus the sleeve may be turned back for convenience in working. The width of the skirt at the foot is about 24 yards.
