"The teachings of Christ have been misinterpreted and misunderstood throughout the ages," said Rev. Mr. Fallis, in developing his theme that "The kingdom of this world shall become the Kingdom of Christ in which He shall rule for ever and ever! We perish without this vision," declared the speaker. "The power of man depends upon his ability to dream dreams and to see visions. If we do not possess this power we live passive, confined existences, not militant, confident and aggressive lives. 
