

LLOYD GEORGE AGAIN UPHELD ON IRISH POLICY

Government Survives Keen Attack in Commons by Unionist "Diehards."

HOUSE DIVIDES 342 TO 73

Banbury Resolution To Cut Secretary For Ireland's Salary Defeated.

LONDON, June 26.—After a debate, which was not so heated or acrimonious as had been expected, the government won tonight a virtual victory on its Irish policy, when a "diehard" resolution proposed by Sir Frederick Banbury (Unionist), for a reduction of the chief secretary for Ireland's salary as an expression of disapproval of the government's policy and failure to afford protection for Field Marshal Henry H. Wilson, was defeated. The vote was 342 to 73.

Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for the colonies, in his statement on Irish affairs, made it clear that the imperial government would expect the provisional government, now that it had secured the people's mandate, to take the necessary steps to assert its complete authority, and with equal frankness emphasized that the British government would not allow the coercion of Ulster by the South—in fact, that failure to observe the treaty would mean the British government resuming complete freedom of action.

Must Observe Treaty.
Premier Lloyd George, in a brief speech winding up the debate, reviewed the familiar arguments in support of the government's policy, and contended that the Irish provisional government now had the people of Ireland behind it, and what it did or failed to do would be the real test of whether it was fit to govern.

The question of Field Marshal Wilson's murder did not figure in the debate as largely as might have been anticipated. Home Secretary Short-

was able to show that the ministers and others from whom police protection had been withdrawn had acquiesced in the withdrawal.

Loud cheers greeted the announcement of the result of the vote, giving a substantial majority for the government.

Will Support Ulster.

He said the situation on the Ulster frontier was easier as a result of the triple arrangement made between the British, the Provisional and Northern governments, whereby a neutral zone four miles wide was to be established in the Pettigo and Belleek districts. The Sinn Féin, Mr. Churchill declared, had to realize that they would never win Ulster except by their own free will, and that the more they kicked the worse it would be for them. He said the imperial government would endeavor to stand between the antagonists and prevent the loss of life and the destruction of property, and by so doing make it absolutely clear that any attempt from Southern forces to break into the territory of Northern Ireland would be met and repulsed by imperial power.

Having regard for the fact that there had been an assassination of a prominent man in England, Mr. Churchill declared that for generations, and even in the height of the Irish struggle, no attempt had been made upon the lives of public persons in this country, and that it was monstrous to make the tragic event and distasteful outrage which had just taken place the ground for an attack upon the police authorities or upon the home secretary.

Must Observe Treaty.
Such things as the occupation of the Four Courts building in Dublin by the Irish republican army must come to an end, Mr. Churchill declared.

He said the Irish government would be told that it must observe the Anglo-Irish treaty or the imperial government would not legalize its further stages. Now that the northern government had been so greatly strengthened, he added, it became all the more its duty to prevent unlawful reprisals however great the provocation. With the election over, there was no excuse, he said, for the provisional government's failings.

Pastor Dismayed at Suggestion of a Heaven With Pearly Gates

WHITBY, June 26.—"I don't believe in a Heaven of pearly gates peopled with angels playing eternally upon harps—the very suggestion of such an existence fills me with dismay," declared Rev. Samuel Fallis, D.D., of the Methodist Book Room, Toronto, in the course of a stirring ordination sermon delivered at the Methodist Tabernacle, Whitby, upon the solemn occasion of admittance of Lloyd MacDonald into the ministry of the Methodist Church.

"The teachings of Christ have been misinterpreted and misunderstood throughout the ages," said Rev. Mr. Fallis, in developing his theme that "The kingdom of this world shall become the Kingdom of Christ in which He shall rule for ever and ever! We perish without this vision," declared the speaker. "The power of man depends upon his ability to dream dreams and to see visions. If we do not possess this power we live passive, confined existences, not militant, confident and aggressive lives. Man may be classified according to his vision. While some still believe in Heaven," Rev. Mr. Fallis said, "we are thinking more and more of this earth and every day less of Heaven."

INSPECT RAILWAY LINES IN ONTARIO

Toronto, June 26.—A party of 100 railway men, members of the Detroit Passenger Club, passed through Toronto this morning on the completion of their annual outing, which took them this year to the Lake of Bays. The principal railway lines of the United States were represented. Detroit men being joined by passenger traffic officials from many points in the southern section of the United States.

The Detroit Passenger Club has, during the past ten seasons, visited the various sections of the United States, and it was the desire of the members this year to inspect the development that has taken place in the Highlands of Ontario and observe the new facilities that have been created to attract tourists. The party left Detroit on Saturday and traveled over the lines of the Grand Trunk railway system, reaching the Lake of Bays on Sunday morning. Special steamboats were in readiness and complete tour was made of the chain of lakes in the Lake of Bays district.

The leading hotels in the region were visited and the party lunched at the Bigwin Inn, the largest of the Canadian summer resorts hotels. The transportation men were greatly impressed with the enterprise displayed by Canadians in the upbuilding of tourist traffic.

EXPECT FURTHER STRIFE IN CHINA

SHANGHAI, June 26.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen's northern army, estimated at 50,000, still remains loyal to the deposed president of South China, and is marching on Canton in three sections, according to reports received here from Canton sources, believed to be reliable. Sun's forces now converging upon Canton are declared to outnumber the troops under Chen Chung Ming, who deposed Sun.

Chinese observers predict severe warfare between the two factions with the odds in favor of the restoration of Sun Yat Sen, and the defeat of Chen.

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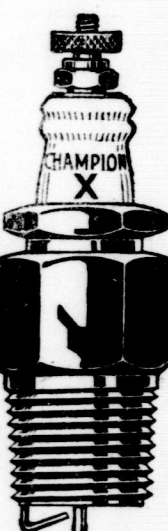
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
