The judgment on the date mentioned was delivered by Lord Cave. who is now the lord chancellor. He said at the time that the judicial committee of the privy council had decided to announce the judgment

at once, and to give their reasons therefor at a later date.

The award against which the shareholders appealed to the law lords was that the preference and common stocks of the Grand Trunk Railway had no value. Sir Walter Cassels, chairman of the board of arbitrators, and Sir Thomas White ada, agreed to this award, but it was dissented from by the third arbitrator, Hon. William Howard Taft, former president of the United

Mr. Taft valued the stocks in question at \$48,000,000.
