CASES OF CRUELTY. Three cases of cruelty were reported to the Humane Society over the week-end. In all the cases horses were being mistreated by the owners.

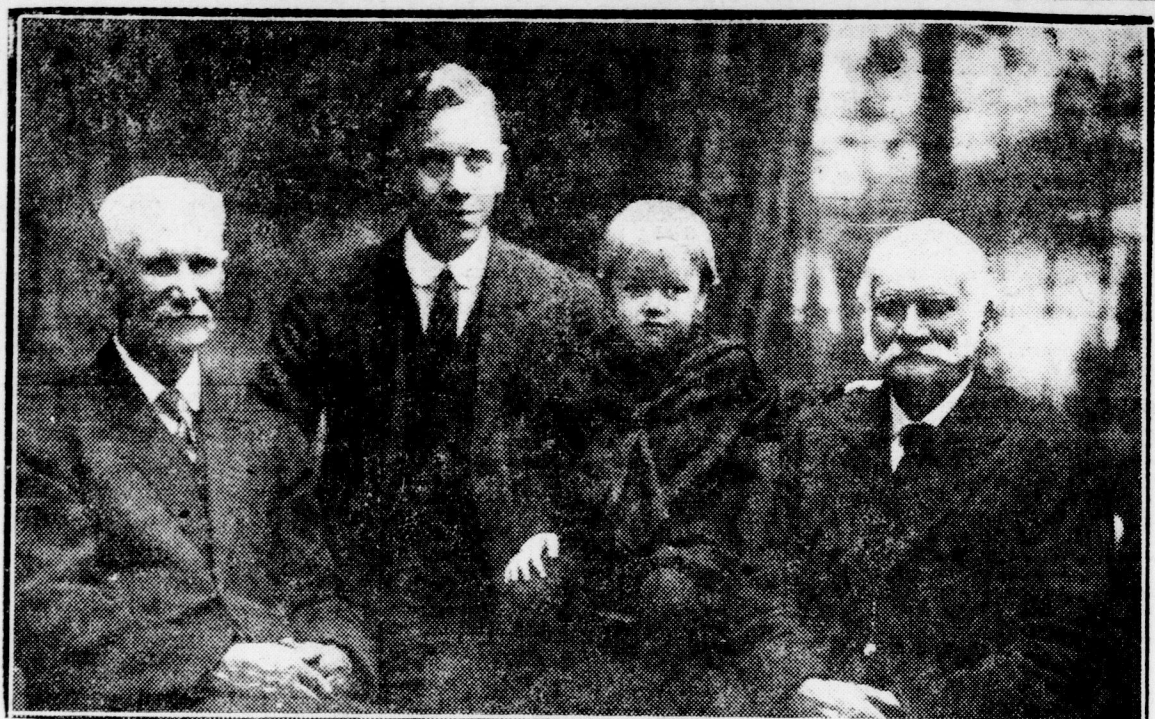

CANADIAN OLYMPIC SPRINTER DEFEATED

Harold Osborne, Ontario, Canada, won the running high jump with his record jump of 6 feet 6 inches giving the United States a victory in another event.

The Olympic yacht race, in which the competing yachts must all be of the same design and in which race N. M. Robertson of Hamilton, Ont., is the only Canadian who has been advanced from July 3, the date originally set, to July 15.

The Olympic committee has been advised that the Canadian canoeists who are to take part in the Olympic sports will arrive, along with the boxers, from Canada tomorrow.

Royal Canadian Mounted, N.J., in the pentathlon, broke the world's record for the broad jump with 7.76 metres, equivalent to 25 feet 6 inches.

Harley's high jumps in this morning's shoot topped 98 and Canada's high jumps totalled 94, with the United States marksmen in eighth place with a total of 91.

The United States Olympic fencing team this morning won into the final round by defeating the Swiss team, Great Britain, Holland, Cuba, and Switzerland, with two defeats each in the second round, were eliminated, so that only the United States, Portugal and Italy remained in the final round.

SMITH GAIN MARKS TODAY'S BALLOTING

Associated Press Despatch. New York, July 6.—William G. McAdoo tonight accepted the proposal of the fifteen other presidential candidates that all release their delegates to the Democratic national convention, but with the proviso that the unit rule and the two-thirds rule both be abrogated.

McAdoo further stipulated that with the resumption of voting the low man be dropped on each succeeding ballot until a nomination is made.

McAdoo's counter proposal presented in the form of a letter addressed jointly to Chairman Hull of the Democratic national committee and Senator Walsh of Montana, chairman of the convention, was as follows:

"Gentlemen: The agreement just submitted to me, signed by the various candidates of the convention for releasing their delegates to the Democratic national convention, is a most commendable plan in the direction of whatever nature so far as the nomination for president is concerned, does not, in my opinion, offer a solution for the unfortunate deadlock in the convention. We must, therefore, adopt a practical plan which will effect the deadlock no matter what effect it will have on any individual candidate.

"I, therefore propose that in addition to releasing all delegates as proposed in the agreement submitted, the unit rule in this convention be abrogated; that the majority rule be substituted for the two-thirds rule in nominating a candidate for president and vice-president; that each of the delegates present from each state shall be entitled to cast his pro rata of the vote of all the delegates from such states as may have delegates absent from the convention; that, after the next ballot and each succeeding ballot of the candidates formerly placed before this convention, the one receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped from the list of candidates until a nomination is made.

"I submit herewith a form of the proposed agreement which I am willing to sign along with the other candidates.

"Respectfully yours, (Signed) "W. G. McAdoo."
