

# 19-year-old slayer IS HANGED AT SOREL

Henri Messier Pays Death Penalty For Murder of Butcher.

(3) The prevalence of fog, unknown to meteorologists, as well as the snow storm reported at the Barren islands at the time of Amundsen's hop-off, would indicate the existence of a northeasterly wind blowing over the polar basin across the path being followed by the fliers.

The above conditions were unknown to the fliers, and Amundsen and Ellsworth, in effecting a landing for the purpose of further observation after seven hours of high speed flight were justified in believing themselves very close to the north pole, if not actually there.

After passing through the fog they were able to observe the character of the polar ice and saw that landing of the polar ice and saw that landing upon this ice would be impossible without disaster. The opening of a water lane, showing dark blue against the white surface of the frozen seas, coming at the seventh hour of flight, seems nothing short of providential. The bringing down of the aeroplanes without mishap testified to the extraordinary skill of the aeroplane pilots. after landing was only to be expected, as water lanes in that high latitude freeze over with great rapidity.

## Valuable Experience.

Amundsen's experience over the actual polar sea ice should be of great value to the MacMillan party in governing their proposed polar In governing their proposed polar flights, landing upon the sea ice, as all who have had Arctic experience know, will always be fraught with the most hazardous of chances to the most nazardous of chances to any aeroplane coming in contact with the surface at speeds of fifty to sixty miles an hour. The only hope for a safe landing appears to be an open water lane or an oc-casional flat field of ice between the pressure ridges. As noted by Amundsen the water lanes are readily observed from a height.
