Public schools of the U.S. began the school year with a shortage of 30,000 teachers, due to low salaries paid.

North German Lloyd Line will resume service with the U. S., a few steamships left are hardly more than a thousand tons each.

Martineta Longwaite, who was stabbed in a fight at Brantford, is not expected to live.

Rev. Canon Wm. Walsh, of Brantford, passed away after about a year's serious illness.

Dr. John M. Platt, of Picton, formerly warden of Kingston Penitentiary, died at the age of 82.

Death sentence was pronounced on Mrs. Loyce Thompson, Kingston, for the murder of her infant.

Brantford has had sixteen fires in ten days, supposed to have been caused by some half-witted person.

One man was killed and 13 injured in an explosion at the Canadian Vickers Shipbuilding Co., Montreal.

The annual convention of the new Brunswick and Prince Edward Island W.C.T.U. is being held in St. John, N.B.

Milk producers of Kent will petition the Commerce Board to hold a session in Chatham to investigate the cost of producing milk.

A Board of Conciliation has been appointed to investigate the dispute between the Minto Coal Mines, of New Brunswick, and the miners.

The Winnipeg Local Council of Women has withdrawn from the National Council in protest against the policy of the June convention at Regina.

While visiting at the home of her grandfather, little Phyllis Retallack Port Hope, died from injuries received by being run over by a load of grain.

F. H. Vandecar, London, was sentenced to not less than three months and not more than two years in the Ontario Reformatory for breaking into Strong's drug store.

Mrs. F. Gachford, Halifax, colored, died from injuries received by jumping from a swiftly moving automobile while after a quarrel with her husband, who has been arrested.

Lillian and Mary Stephens, who went with a show company leaving St. John, and who were traced to Shatham, and placed on a train to return home, have not been heard of since.
