### Ninety One Recovered

Twenty More Bodies Taken Out at Fernie Mines By Last Night

Twenty Still Missing—Additional Names of Victims of the Explosion.

### Provincial Mineralogist Corrects Wrong Reports as Cause of Accident.

Fernie, May 28.—The work of rescuing the dead has been proceeding with some rapidity during the past 24 hours, some 29 bodies having been taken out. The total number recovered now reaches 91, and it is expected that some 100 or more will be taken out before the end of the week.

REPORTS OF MORE ERUPTION  
Vessels Passing Martinique See Mount Pelee Vomiting Clouds of Smoke.

Rosetan, Island of Dominica, May 28.—The British steamer Sagan, from London for Barbados and West Indian ports, has arrived here. She passed Mount Pelee, Island of Martinique, at 9 o'clock this morning, when a thick black cloud was arising from the volcano. The officers of the Sagan believed, from the quantity of dust which fell on the steamer, that another eruption had occurred.

St. John's, Island of Antigua, B.W.I., May 28.—The British steamer Fontainebleau, from New York via West Indian ports, has arrived here. The vessel was accompanied by a large quantity of smoke and ash from Mount Pelee, which was visible 40 miles away. Dust fell on the steamer, which was 50 miles from the island. The Port Beilived landed relief supplies at Ponta Beilived.
