

### JAPANESE HAVE LONG DIFFICULT OPERATION

Russian General S'aff Points Out Work to Be Done at Port Arthur.

St. Petersburg, July 31, 3:40 a. m .-In view of the rumors of the storming and fall of Port Arthur, the general staff authorized the Associated Press to declare positively that not a single position forming a part of the land defences of Port Arthur has yet fallen into the enemy's hands and that the besiegers are nowhere nearer than eight or ten miles to the fortress. The general staff also declares that the bombardments reported July 26 and 27 were nothing more than preliminaries to an attempt to capture one of the outer positions, probably Lunvantan, to the east. If the Japanese succeed in taking one of these positions they will have to bring up siege guns under a finnking fire from the other positions and from cruisers sent out for this purpose. If this proves possible, then only will the Japanese be able to bombard the fortress itself and prepare for the final assault, and it is easy to see what a long, dangerous and difficult operation is before them. al staff authorized the Associated Press
