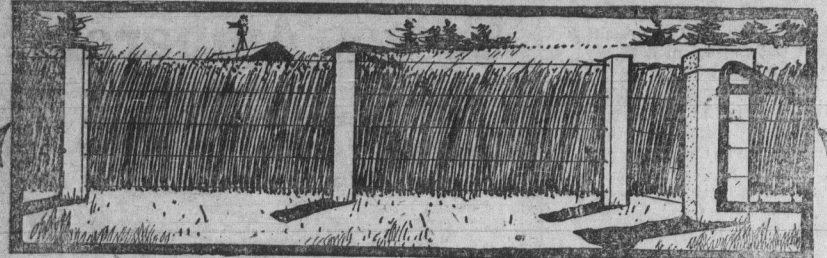

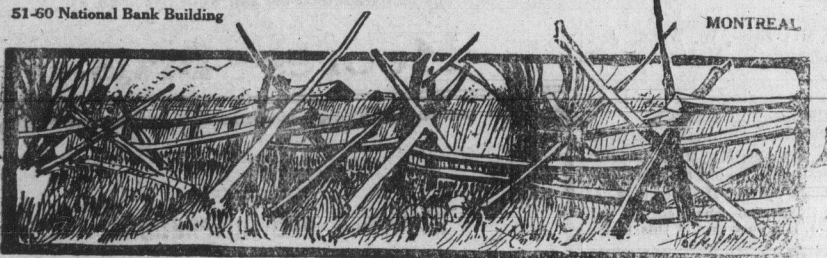

## MERCHANTS' AND CLERKS' DINNER

Large and Enthusiastic  
Gathering at Windsor  
Hotel

In the Windsor Hotel on Wed-  
nesday evening a large gathering  
sat down to a dinner which was  
held under the auspices of the  
Merchants and Clerks' Association,  
nearly seventy being present. Mine  
Host Mr. J. J. Gray and his able  
assistants prepared a most appet-  
izing meal, which was enjoyed by  
all. Councillor Alexander presid-  
ed, and among the guests were:  
Police Judge Matheson, Judge  
Bodkin, U. S. Consul and A. E. G.  
McKenzie.

After the toast of "the King",  
the Chairman in his remarks out-  
lined the aims of the Society, which  
existed in the first place for the  
mutual benefit of the merchants  
and their clerks. It was not an  
Association to boost prices but  
rather to lower them, and ways  
and means would be found to have  
the merchants buy in larger lots  
and endeavor to compete with the  
Catalogue trade. There were still  
a few who had not signed the con-  
stitution and only one who had  
signed had gone back and kept his  
store open.

Mr. A. E. G. McKenzie deplored  
the lack of healthy amusements.  
No clubs could be established when  
the young men were  
unable to get into touch  
with each other, in the orga-  
nizing of Boating and Athletic  
Clubs. Jokingly he twitted the  
Chairman regarding the request  
for his legal opinion. Amid loud  
laughter he said that when the  
Executive came forward with the  
necessary retaining fee, he would  
be happy to state his opinion.

Judge Matheson voiced the senti-  
ments of the purchasers and said  
that he was sure all were in favor  
of the early closing, and he was in  
deep sympathy with the move-  
ment and would do all in his power  
to help it along to a successful  
issue.

Why should a shopkeeper have  
longer hours than even the veriest  
laborer? Why should stores be  
held open for those people to come  
down after their work is finished,  
for small articles which quite easily  
could be got earlier in the day?  
Get after the women to have their  
shopping done early.

Judge Bodkin, the U. S. Consul  
who was received with "He's a  
Jolly Good Fellow" spoke interest-  
ingly on the time he has spent  
in Campbellton during which time  
he had learned to love the town.  
He said that Campbellton as the  
Trade Centre had exported goods  
to the United States to the value  
of \$965,000. When it is remem-  
bered that invoices of less than  
\$100 are not noticed through his  
consular reports, these small ship-  
ments would total \$250,000, mak-  
ing in all over a million dollars.  
The fire effected the exports this  
year and since 11th July the value
