**FATHER BOUCHER
HAS RETIRED**
Address and Purse Presented at Dalhousie Tuesday Evening.

Rev. A. A. Boucher who has not been enjoying good health for some time, has resigned as pastor of the R. C. congregation of Dalhousie, and will go to the New England States, to spend the winter months.

On Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock in the Convent Hall before a very large attendance of his parishioners he was presented with addresses of gratitude, and a purse of \$185.00. The address in French was read by Miss Anastasie Paquet, and the one in English, by Mr. Harry McEvoy. Rev. A. A. Boucher, who was taken by surprise, was deeply touched by the expressions of sympathy in the addresses, about his health, and the gratitude of his people, for what he had done for the good of religion and education. He thanked all for their extreme kindness towards him, and said that he hoped, after several months of rest, to return to Dalhousie; but not with the intention of carrying any further responsibility.

It is understood here that Rev. J. A. Hart, of St. Michael's Cathedral, Chatham, N. B., is to be Rev. Father Boucher's successor in Dalhousie.

OTTAWA, Dec. 31.—The total customs revenue of the Dominion for the year ending today amounted to \$109,071,034, or an increase of \$14,345,623 over last year, when it totalled \$154,725,411. The statement covering the first nine months of the fiscal year which also ends today, shown an increase of \$10,232,657 over a similar period in 1918. For the nine months' period ending today, the total customs receipts were \$130,286,220, while in 1918 they were \$119,355,563.

The month of December alone shows an increase of \$3,903,151. December receipts this year were \$15,836,007, and last year they were \$11,332,055.

**SLIGHT INCREASE
ADMISSION PRICES**
Slight Increase in Moving Picture Admission Prices to Take Effect Next Monday.

Early in December the management of the Opera House announced that, owing to the excessive rental prices now being demanded for films and the greatly increased cost of all advertising accessories, material and supplies incidental to the carrying on of the business, it would soon be found necessary to all in line with the majority of theatres all over the country to increase the price of admission.

At that time it was stated that ninety nine per cent of the theatres in the Maritime Provinces were charging 20c. and more. A full canvas now reveals the fact that there are not more than four or at the outside five theatres that are operating at less than the 20c. minimum for adults.

Further, it is understood that of the four two of these namely, the Grand New Theatre are to raise immediately.

When the previous announcement was made it was the intention to raise the following week, but this was postponed on account of the nearness of the Holiday Season and in consideration of the numerous demands usually made on pocketbooks at that time.

However the time has arrived when it is absolutely impossible to continue longer at the present prices and make ends meet. Therefore starting next Monday, January 12th, the regular admission price will be raised to 20c. for adults and 15c. for children.

These prices will prevail four days a week at the Opera House, namely, Monday, Tuesday, Friday and Saturday. On Wednesday and Thursday at the Opera House, the prices, for the time being at least, will remain at present 25c. for adults and 15c. for children. On these days, for some time past, the management have been presenting big special productions—pictures for which from 50c. to \$1.50 is being asked elsewhere.

This arrangement is still in the experimental stage and if patrons do not wish to pay 25c. for the biggest and best pictures the management will not insist on showing them. However the arrangement so far seems to have met with general favor and it is felt that when the public see some of the features which are booked for early showing the demand will be for a continuance of the policy.

The Saturday matinee regular price WILL REMAIN UNCHANGED as at present, adults 10c., children 5c.

Regarding the Imperial Theatre, the prices will be 20c. for adults and 15c. for children. This house will be open when entertainments of any kind other than pictures are being staged at the Opera House.

**BOARDS OF TRADE
DISCUSS BRIDGE**
Important Meeting Called for Friday Evening January 9th.

An important meeting of the Board of Trade will be held in the Council Chamber, Murray Building, Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

The principal matter for discussion will be the matter of the proposed bridge at Campbellton.

Invitations have been sent to Hon. John Bull Kelly and others from the province to be present and observe the action which will be taken.

There are a number of other matters, such as the formation of a real estate association for the district, and the encouragement of the people to use electric power from the local power house, which will be discussed by the Board at this time.

It is hoped that the large number of the town will attend this meeting in full force.
