A firm adherence to plain and straight ogical consequences would have made Mr. Blake premier of Canada years ago. At Aurora he talked of political independ ence, or something equivalent, for Canada; but he failed to see that commercial independence, or, in other words, protection,

was the only foundation upon which it could be built. He got hold of the purely political idea, but he missed the cognate economical idea, without which it not worth "shucks." Commer--manufacturing

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
