The unhappy Egyptians are truly the servants of servants, but is not long since even they made a mad break for freedom from foreign control. Little Bulgaria shivers against the restraints that Russia has placed upon her.

Indeed it is an uproar over Home Rule, though the representation in the Imperial Parliament. Even in Scotland and Wales there is a strong feeling against the idea of Home Rule.

The German Catholic newspaper "Welt" at Chicago has recent passed resolutions requesting German Catholic workers not to join the K. of L. One of the objections raised against the latter was that Powderly and his allies are Irish.

The Hamilton Spectator is somewhat shocked because The Mail is spending the sixteenth year of its checked career in daily efforts to prove that the articles published by it during the preceding sixteen years were parts of an elaborate system of falsehoods.


