Gough Surprised At Hearing Certain Items.

TESTIFIES AT THE TRIAL

Denies Knowledge of Crerar's Reason For Resigning

TORONTO, Dec. 30 .- Although he would not say that it was a forgery, R. P. Gough, Home Bank director, under cross-examination this morning in his trial in which he is charged with approving and concurring in false statement's of the bank's affairs, maintained that an item on the minutes of the bank board of September 20 was never read to him. This item requested confirmation of the board by the Toronto branch for a demand note of \$196,186 for the Manufacturers' Holding Company, a Daly concern. D. L. McCarthy, K. C., crown prosecutor,

said the handwriting was in the handwriting of Ocean Smith, chief account ant. Mr. Gough admitted that he had never looked over the minutes of the bank until after he was arrested following the suspension of the bank. He also maintained there were other false entries in the minutes, which he had never heard read. Two others also referred to advances to the Manufact

COUNSEL PROTESTS. This question raised a protest from W. N. Tilley, K. C., defense counsel, and was not answered by the witness, although Judge Coatsworth said the answer was obvious. It also developed that just previous to the end of the bank's fiscal year, May 31, 1920, that the deposits had jumped up nearly three millions to \$21,166,000, and that on June 4 they had gone down to \$19,892,000. The deposits for the few days included two millions from the Province of On tario and half a million from the City of Toronto. 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
