

DEFERS DECISION ON ESTATE CLAIM

Woodstock Woman Claims Foster Father Promised Property

WILL BEQUEATHED NOTHING

Suits for "Commission" on Deal for Plant Dismissed

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 30. — Claiming that the late William Clarkson, her foster-father, had repeatedly promised to leave all his possessions to her in return for many years of work on his farm and had failed to do so in his will, Mrs. M. Brownlee, wife of Dr. Brownlee, brought action in the Supreme Court here to-day to secure possession of the estate.

The evidence of Mrs. Brownlee and several other witnesses was to the effect that she had been legally adopted by Mr. Clarkson and had worked on his farm most of her life up to the time of her marriage in 1922, and had received no payment, but that Mr. Clarkson had promised to leave everything to her. The latter statement was corroborated by many neighbors. The only defense was that, in Mr. Clarkson's will, nothing was left to Mrs. Brownlee.

Justice Kelly reserved his judgment, but summed up strongly in favor of the plaintiff, saying that if the legal aspect of the case had been cleared up, he felt the plaintiff was entitled to remuneration for the work she had done towards building up the estate.

DISMISSES CLAIMS. Justice Kelly, in Supreme Court here this morning, delivered his judgment in the action for \$5,000 brought by Edwin Holden, of this city, against the La France Textiles, Limited, and Bernard Davis, president of the company, by dismissing both actions. The plaintiff claimed that Davis had promised to pay \$5,000 to Holden in connection with the purchase of the Sterling Textile Company's plant by his company, and had failed to pay.

In his judgment Justice Kelly dismissed the action against the company on the ground that it was not in existence when the alleged offer was made, and against Davis on the ground that the promise was not in writing as required by the Statute of Frauds. He said, however, that Holden had a moral claim against Davis, and suggested that the costs against the plaintiff be waived, which was agreed to by the defendant.

DECLARES BOYS NEVER BETTER

Brother Barnabas Defends the Lads of To-Day

URGES TRAINED LEADERS

OTTAWA, Sept. 30. — "Boys were never better than they are to-day," Brother Barnabas, director of boy welfare work for the Knights of Columbus, told the Child Welfare Conference to-night. "The church, the home and the school no longer supplied sufficient occupation for the boy as they used to do, said Brother Barnabas. The modern age had deprived many boys of their heroes in that fathers were so often and for long hours away from home, and in the fact that usually the school teacher was a woman and not a man. "No wonder many boys think they ought to keep the cops from getting fat. "The boy is coming into his own these days. We must train the boys' leisure time. The new science of 'boyology' with its club program to fill the leisure time is going to solve our difficulties. We must train experts in this science and use no others in boy work."

The other speakers were Mrs. Robert W. Reford, of Montreal, and Prof. E. D. MacPhee, director of research department of psychology, Toronto University.

DEFERS DECISION ON ESTATE CLAIM

Woodstock Woman Claims Foster Father Promised Property

WILL BEQUEATHED NOTHING

Suits for "Commission" on Deal for Plant Dismissed

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 30. — Claiming that the late William Clarkson, her foster-father, had repeatedly promised to leave all his possessions to her in return for many years of work on his farm and had failed to do so in his will, Mrs. M. Brownlee, wife of Dr. Brownlee, brought action in the Supreme Court here to-day to secure possession of the estate.

The evidence of Mrs. Brownlee and several other witnesses was to the effect that she had been legally adopted by Mr. Clarkson and had worked on his farm most of her life up to the time of her marriage in 1922, and had received no payment, but that Mr. Clarkson had promised to leave everything to her. The latter statement was corroborated by many neighbors. The only defense was that, in Mr. Clarkson's will, nothing was left to Mrs. Brownlee.

Justice Kelly reserved his judgment, but summed up strongly in favor of the plaintiff, saying that if the legal aspect of the case had been cleared up, he felt the plaintiff was entitled to remuneration for the work she had done towards building up the estate.

DISMISSES CLAIMS. Justice Kelly, in Supreme Court here this morning, delivered his judgment in the action for \$5,000 brought by Edwin Holden, of this city, against the La France Textiles, Limited, and Bernard Davis, president of the company, by dismissing both actions. The plaintiff claimed that Davis had promised to pay \$5,000 to Holden in connection with the purchase of the Sterling Textile Company's plant by his company, and had failed to pay.

In his judgment Justice Kelly dismissed the action against the company on the ground that it was not in existence when the alleged offer was made, and against Davis on the ground that the promise was not in writing as required by the Statute of Frauds. He said, however, that Holden had a moral claim against Davis, and suggested that the costs against the plaintiff be waived, which was agreed to by the defendant.

The new science of 'boyology' with its club program to fill the leisure time is going to solve our difficulties. We must train experts in this science and use no others in boy work."
