The Late Lieut.-Col. Tanner

(From the Moosomin, Sask., Spectator)

Once again the Town of Moosomin is called upon to mourn the death of one of its most prominent citizens, fallen in the fight somewhere in France.

On Sunday last the news was flashed across the vast expanse of land and water that separates Canada from her brave sons that Lieut.-Col. Tanner was seriously wounded. Early Monday morning a cable was received stating that he had passed away.

It seems almost impossible to believe that the smiling face of the genial, warm hearted physician will never again be seen by his friends here; but so it is; and today a deep sadness pervades all Moosomin. He had not been in France long before the fate of the soldier overtook him. He left Winnipeg shortly after Christmas in charge of No. 10 Field Ambulance Corps, and could not have been many weeks on duty before the fatal wound was received.

Details of his wounds and death have not yet come to hand.

Lieut. Col. A. W. Tanner was in his 40th year at the time of his death. He was a Past Master of Moosomin Lodge A. F. & A. M., and Past D. D. G. M. of the Grand Lodge, of Saskatchewan.

He came to Moosomin in 1902 and always took a keen interest in civic matters, being a member of the Council Board for two and Mayor for four years, during which time he was always ready and willing to devote both time and talent in the town's interests. The flags of Moosomin are now at half mast out of respect for his memory.

He leaves to mourn his loss a widow

and four small children, the eldest only eight years of age. To the bereaved ones the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended.

A public memorial service will be held in the opera hall next Sunday at 3.30 p. m.

Former Watfordite Drops Dead.

The Saginaw, Mich., papers give an account of the sudden death of Dougald A. McDonald, a prominent resident of the west side in that city for the past 40 years, by an attack of heart failure or apoplexy that struck him down on Genesee avenue on Friday of last week. Mr. McDonald was proprietor of the Saginaw Towel Supply Co., and was 69 years old. The funeral took place on Sunday to the Forest Lawn cemetery.

Mr. McDonald was born in the township of Brooke in 1847. For some time he conducted a harness shop in Watford, and will be remembered by the older residents. He moved to Saginaw about the year 1876 and followed his trade of harness maker for about 30 years. He later engaged in the laundry business and sold coffee, both of which businesses he maintained at the time of his death. He was a member of the Gospel Hall Association and an active Christian worker. He was married to Miss Lillian Renier, daughter of the late Peter Renier of Watford, and is survived by one son, Sydney, of Kinde, Mich.

Huron Battalion Gets Another Grant From County

Goderich, June 9th.—The Huron County Council this afternoon voted \$2,500 to the Huron War Auxiliary to cover expenses incurred in recruiting for the 161st Battalion and to provide mess tents and other regimental equipment. This supplements a grant of \$2,000 made at the January session for recruiting purposes. The Council decided also to continue the payments of \$5,000 a month to the Canadian Patriotic Fund, and additional debentures to the amount of \$60,000 will at once be issued on this account.
