The Field of Waterloo.

From the London Tribune: Several
passages in the very interesting article "A
Week at Waterloo" in the April "Century
Magazine" bring home to us what to the
English visitor of to-day is undoubtedly the
most striking impression of the scene—its
exceeding smallness. There is perhaps no
better way of appreciating the difference
which the modern firearm has wrought in
the whole art of war than to stand on the
very gradual, bald slope held by the British
infantry on that memorable June Sunday,
and to look out over the field from Hou-
goumont to La Haye Sainte and across to
the position some few hundred yards dis-
tant occupied by the French forces. The
whole field is so contracted a scale that
a rifleman from any point could easily
command the whole of it, including the
position of the artillery and the reserves,
and the very armies as they lay encamped
could have shouted to each other across the
narrow intervening space. The whole
evolution of modern tactics, from those
days of massed infantry to the far-flung,
dotted line of the present, suggests itself
to the visitor who surveys the narrow arena
on which the armies of ninety years ago
could decide the fate of Europe.

To Keep For Reference.

The following antidote for poisons should
be kept where they can be quickly referred
to in every nursery. For landnum, mor-
phine and opium first give a strong emetic
of mustard and water, then very strong
coffee and acid drinks. Dash cold water on
the head and keep in constant motion.
In arsenical poisoning give as quickly as
possible an emetic of mustard and salt,
tablespoonful of each to a cup of warm
water. Follow with sweet oil, warmed
butter or milk. The white of an egg in a
half cup of milk may also be used, or milk
and lime water. Get a physician as soon as
possible. For sumonia give lemon juice or
vinegar.

**Homestead Entries are Nearly
Double.**

Ottawa, Ont., May 11.—The homestead
entries granted during the month of April
were nearly twice as large as for April 1905.
The entries were 6,200, compared with
3,790 for April, 1905, an increase of
2,413. The principal increases are at
Battledore, Edmonton, Red Deer, Regina
and Alameda.

predecessors, his life from boyhood up was devoid of incident.

peculiarly haunting melody.

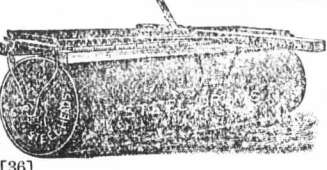
Almost all his works were written for pianoforte solo. When
he made his debut in Vienna at the age of 19, he was even then a
finished virtuoso. But he was the very opposite of his contemporary,
the mighty Liszt, or his brilliant countryman, Paderewski. They could
make the piano thunder and roar, but Chopin made it cry—with inde-
