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The Insolvency Question.

Below we give the disquisition that recently took place in the Chamber of Commerce on the Insolvency Question. The following gentlemen were present at the meeting:

Mr. John Doall, chairman, Messrs. M. Carney, J. T. Wood, A. Burns, J. J. Brown, T. E. Kenny, Hon. James B. Butler, John Pugh, Robert Taylor, C. F. DeWolf, J. C. Macintosh and S. A. White, Esq.

Mr. T. E. Kenny, of the Committee appointed to consider the Insolvency Question, reported verbally that the committee had been prosecuting inquiries most actively as to what form of law would be best.

The secretary read a circular from the Montreal Board of Trade which pointed out the necessity of an insolvency measure which would give relief without encouraging insolvency.

Mr. Kenny thought the difficulty generally had been that creditors were careless. He believed there should be a compulsory examination into the affairs of an insolvent by a special court.

Mr. Taylor thought, though at present they all knew of a somewhat glaring case, on the whole they seemed to be getting on very well with the insolvent act.

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Prisoners Indemnity Bank.

At the adjourned meeting of the directors of the following suggested compromise was submitted by them with reference to the consideration of the meeting:

1. That in addition to the payment of their double liability upon their shares, the directors withdraw all the claims to dividends upon the \$48,000 paid by them on their guarantee to the Union Bank of London, so that this \$48,000 be paid absolute to the Bank.

2. That the directors provide for the refunding or payment of the Bank of P. E. Island by the Bank of Montreal the sum of \$1,700, the latter Bank since the acquisition of the Bank of P. E. Island.
