To give a fine gloss to linen, a good quality of starch must be used. It is best to get it by the box of six pounds or more, as it comes cheaper and is always at hand. The empty box is useful for other purposes. I have read of many additions to starch to give a gloss, such a white wax, sperma ceti and gum arabic, and have tried them all, but find them of no advantage if good starch is used. Gum arabic with cold starch sometimes make the linen stiff. Mix the quantity of starch required with cold water to about the consistency of thin cream, then pour in boiling water and stir briskly.
