He could not grant a blessing without faith ; but, however feeble was the voice of faith. He was ever ready to hear, and, however weak the hand of faith, he was ever willing to fill it. He is the same to-day. He never changes. Have faith in God.

There are great moments in life when we stand at the parting of the ways. The voice of conscience, which is the voice of God, calls one way, the voice of the world, the other way. And even if one struggles back into the right way, something is lost that he may never secover. Browning is right :

" Life's business is just the terrible choice."

How sad when an opportunity is lost forever ! How pathetic the story of the aged Carlyle standing beside the grave of his wife, whose life he might have made happier, and murmuring to himself : " If I had known ! If I had known !" It is sad to lose an opportunity forever ; but how incomparably and to lose God forever! "Seek ye the Lord while Ha may be found. Call ye upon Him while He He is near." It is well said by Bishop Ryle that " True repentance is never late ; but late repentance is seldom true." The words of the same
