ALBERT NAPPER, the originator of cottage-hospitals, died on November 16th, at the age of seventy-nine years. He established the first cottage-hospital in 1859.

OUR MEDICAL STUDENTS.—England has but 552 medical students; there are 8,000 in the Germany universities, but the United States has 13.000. We could loan England a few thousand and have plenty to spare.—*Med. Record.* 

CHARCOT, like Gull, physicked his patients very sparingly. If he did not, like Sydenham, recommend students to read "Don Quixote" as a part of their medical education, he thought the works of the so-called "naturalist" school of novel writers useful for other purposes. He used to prescribe certain chapters of Zola as the surest emetic known to him; other works of the same master and his disciples were, in his opinion, valuable as narcotics. To a student who, after a lecture in which erotomania had been touched upon, asked what was the best remedy for incontinence Charcot replied, "Anæmia—or, better still, apoplexy."

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
