MEASURE TO AMEND

The House resumed consideration of the motion of Mrs. McDougall that Bill C-8, an Act to amend the Petroleum and Gas Revenue Tax Act, be read the second time and referred to Committee of the Whole.

Mrs. Mailly: Mr. Speaker, if my hon. colleague from Nickel Belt (Mr. Rodriguez) would pay attention, I would like to ask him a question.

I would like to ask the Hon. Member whether he agrees that some of those people he has been insulting for the last twenty minutes, using every kind of epithet—and I have only one word for this kind of treatment but I will not say it—but in any case, some of the people out West whom he has been insulting are entrepreneurs, Canadians who are investing their energies, their imagination, their money, their dreams and their desires to help their fellow Canadians by creating jobs. These entrepreneurs out West are Canadians too, and they are people who create jobs. Nevertheless, my hon. colleague from Nickel Belt (Mr. Rodriguez) gives the impression that they are just a bunch of thieves without any conscience at all, whose only purpose in life is to get rich.

I would like to ask him a very serious question. Does he not agree that the oil industry creates jobs, as was said so aptly by my hon. colleague from Nepean-Carleton (Mr. Tupper)? When there is a drop in production in the oil industry out West, Canadians in Ontario and Quebec are the ones who suffer. They are still suffering today, and many are unemployed because production went down as a result of a number of signals that, I think, were aimed at scaring off investors and at punishing, as the Hon. Member for Nickel Belt (Mr. Rodriguez) would love to do, at punishing people who prefer to make money through their own energies and efforts instead of getting grants and cheques. In the latter case, they can just sit back and let the State take charge of their lives, tell them where to work, what to do, where to invest—

Does my hon. colleague not have the energy and the interest for a serious debate of a few minutes, instead of indulging in rhetoric which adds nothing to the debate because it is too doctrinaire, emotional and ideological?
