

Taken by those who wished to be admitted to the Bar in St. Lucia. It is open to students who have previously graduated in other faculties. Arrangements could probably be made for extending it to students from St. Lucia who satisfy the requirements of the Matriculation Board of the University.

Course D. is designed to meet the needs of those students who wish to practise law in a jurisdiction where English Law prevails. It is open to all students who satisfy the requirements of the Matriculation Board. I invite your attention to the enclosed time table of the lectures for this course.

The four year course (C) is intended for those candidates for the B.C.L. degree (other than Course B Students) who have not graduated in the other Faculties. It is unlikely that West Indian students will wish to take this course. Arrangements also exist for the combined study of the LL.B. and B.C.L. courses, but with the details of these I need not trouble you. The great majority of West Indian students would probably wish to take either the B.C.L. (Course B) or the LL.B.

In conclusion I would say that it is our earnest desire to see the Law Faculty of McGill University develop into a central School of Law which shall fully meet the needs of students from all the British possessions in the New World. I should, therefore, greatly value any suggestions or criticisms from you which would assist the Faculty to render a greater service to the cause of legal education in the Empire, and any counsel which you may feel disposed to offer will receive most careful consideration.
