

**HEAVY ARRIVALS DEPRESS WHEAT**  
Fine Weather and Receipts of First Car of Grain at Minneapolis Also Have Effect.

CHICAGO, July 28.—Huge primary receipts added as a burden today on wheat. The market closed nervous, 1/4c to 3/4c down. Corn showed a net gain of 1/4c to 3/4c with oats varying from 1/4c decline to 1/4c advance. The outcome for provisions ranged from 2 1/2c off to an upturn of 10c.

Arrivals of wheat today at the chief terminal cities reached the extraordinary total of 3,118,000 bushels, as against 2,235,000 bushels at the corresponding time a year ago. The visible supply, too, increased to an unexpected extent. Simultaneously new wheat was being offered to arrive here from the northwest, and there was word that Minneapolis had today received the first car from the new spring crop.

Weak cables gave the market a downward impulse at the start. Fine weather northwest added to the bearish feeling. No new export contracts were reported here or elsewhere, and milling was reported at a standstill. A couple of little rallies were attempted, but the news from the west and the fact that buyers were wary of the lowest price of the year.

Alleged insufficiency of rain ran up the price of corn. Many despatches from the crop to be being. Damage advices from Nebraska were worse and Kansas estimates pointed to the smallest yield there since 1901.

Oats followed corn early, but later succumbed to the influence of the weakness in wheat. Active options in provisions held about steady. The effect of a decline at the yards was offset by the bullishness of corn.
