 MONTREAL, July 28. — At the Montreal Stock Yards west end market, receipts for the week ended July 26 were 1600 cattle, 2100 sheep and lambs, 1650 hogs and 650 catves. The offerings on the market this morning for sale amounted to 1150 cattle, 1600 sheep and lambs, 350 hogs and 360 calves.
 The weaker feeling which came to the surface of the market for cattle last week was the principal feature of the trade again today, and prices showed a further decline of 25c per 100 pounds. Increased offerings and the warm weather are held responsible for this reduction. Sales of full loads of choice steers, averaging 1200 pounds each, were made at \$6.75; good at \$6 to \$6.25, and medium to fair at \$4.75 to \$5.25 per 100 pounds. Canners' cows sold at from \$2.75 to \$3.25, and bulls at \$3.50 to \$4 per 100 pounds. A much stronger feeling developed in the market for sheep and lambs, and prices for the former advanced 50c, ard for the latter 25c to 50c per 100 pounds.
